

CLUB REGULATING BY-LAW DISCUSSED BY CITY COUNCIL

The city council's proposed club licensing and regulating bylaw received full and free discussion in committee last night. After an hour's deliberation, during which liftle was agreed upon or accomplished, it was decided to rise and leave the by-law over for a weeks. There was general misunderstanding as to the application of the bylaw. Some of the aldermen did not know what clubs were, some did not know there were any clubs in the city. some did not want their pet clubs penalized, and there were various and sundry objections. The general consensus of opinion was that clubs should be regulated as long as that regulation was not j too stringent.

Among the provisions that this club by-law sets out are a club license fee of \$100 per year, registered manager's fee of \$10, good conduct, no prostitutes, no drunkenness, member and guest registers, police inspection, no gaming or gaming devices, closed hours to members and guests between midnight and 7 a.m. when the club is to be locked up. and straight penalty of \$100 or sixty days for infractions.






