ITALY-BRITAIN READY TO PAY DEBTS

BRITISH LABORITE LEADER CRITICAL OF CROWN SPEECH

Poland and Czecho-Slovakia Join In Request For Relief From Obligations Due in December

Called In

London Declares It Cannot Continue Under Present Arrangement Without Defaulting—President Hoover Understood to Be in Favor of "New Deal"

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 23:—The Department of State was advised yesterday that Italy would make its war debt payment as scheduled for December. Poland yesterday joined Great Britain, France, Belgium and Czecho-Slovakia in asking for relief from payments due in December. On Monday Czecho-Slovakia officially deposited a note with the State Department requesting the United States for relief from war debt payments. Czecho-Slovakia has payments amounting to \$1,500,000 coming due in December. In all a total of \$150,000,000 of European debts fall due in December of which Great Britain owes \$95,000,000, France, \$19,000,000 and Belgium, \$2,000,000.

It is believed here that President Hoover will require European nations to pay their war debts due to the United States on December 15 next and will then propose that a conference be held to arrange for a "new deal" on the whole question. It is possible that the president may recommend that the matter be taken up at the forthcoming world economic conference.

Britain Ready to Pay

LONDON, Nov. 23:—It is stated in authoritative quarters here that Great Britain will pay war debts to the United States in December. If payment of same is demanded, but that she will give notice at the same time that further payments on the present arrangement cannot be made and that demand of same will surely mean default.

Opposed to Cancellation

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 23:—Unqualified opposition to cancellation of European war debts to the United States is expressed by Vice-President-Elect John Nance Garner who declares that he believes the large majority of members of the new Congress are of the same opinion.

CONFERENCE IN REGINA

Political Speculation Follows Meeting of Premier Anderson and Mr. Gardiner

REGINA, Sask., Nov. 23:—Political observers are speculating on the significance of a secret conference held at the first of the week between Premier J. T. M. Anderson and James G. Gardiner, former premier and leader of the Liberal party.

The meeting definitely foreshadowed a great measure of cooperation between Conservative and Liberal leaders in the coming session of the Legislature, it is understood.

The fact that the conference was held was announced officially but no details of the meeting were given.

Hoover and Roosevelt Make Progress in Discussion on International Debt Matter

WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 23:—Following a two and a half hour conference yesterday afternoon, it was officially announced on behalf of President Herbert Hoover and President-Elect Franklin D. Roosevelt that they had traversed at length the war debt problem and that progress had been made. Details of the discussions were not revealed.

The president and his successor will meet again today.

At the conference yesterday both Mr. Hoover and Mr. Roosevelt wore ordinary blue business suits. On his arrival at the White House, Mr. Roosevelt was given a hearty handshake and warm welcome by Mr. Hoover.

DRIVE DOGS TO CHICAGO

Clyde Williams Leaves Copper Centre, Alaska, For Windy City

COPPER CENTRE, Alaska, Nov. 23:—With nine Alaskan sled dogs, Clyde Williams, veteran of 31 years of prospecting, trapping and mushing in the northland, has left here on an overland trip to Chicago.

Trumpeter Swans Are Wintering at Queen Charlottes

Inspiring Plea For World Peace By Enlightened Public Opinion Is Made By Gyro Club Speaker

"Not by treaties, by agreements or by laws will the peace of the world be secured but by an enlightened public opinion, a new spirit in the nations, a broad love of truth and justice and service such as is inspired by the life, teachings and spirit of Jesus of Nazareth," declared Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth, pastor of First Presbyterian Church, in an inspiring address on the subject of "World Peace" at yesterday's weekly luncheon of the Prince Rupert Gyro Club.

While the speaker referred to signs that the world had not yet been fully inspired with the spirit of universal peace, he also pointed to certain progress that was being made in this direction.

During the fourteen years since the World War had come to an official close, had anything been learned, asked the speaker. Had people built on the knowledge which came to them through the long dark hours of the great struggle? Had they discovered that evil could not be overcome by evil? Had any steps been taken towards averting another war more terrible than the last?

Mankind at heart, Mr. Hollingworth believed, was sick of war. There was a deep-rooted yearning for that state of brotherhood when nations should no longer rise up against nations and when the blood of brothers should no longer stain the earth. But it should be remembered that peace on earth would not come through yearning alone for it. More or less drastically worded peace resolutions could not stop war in a hundred thousand years. There was only one power which could make peace and that was the power of God in the hearts and minds of the great mass of the human race—in other words, the

National Government Is Attacked For Lack of Workless Policy

Program Planned By Administration Worthy Neither of King or Parliament, George Lansbury Declares During Heated Debate in House

LONDON, Nov. 23:—Shortly after the formal opening of Parliament yesterday, a heated debate arose on the question of unemployment. George Lansbury, leader of the Labor Opposition, attacked the Speech from the Throne, declaring that it was "not worthy of Parliament or of being put in the name of the King." Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald vigorously defended the national government in its efforts to deal with the unemployment problem.

HANSON IS FOR PACT

Voted With Government at Ottawa on Free State Trade Treaty

OTTAWA, Nov. 23:—Olof Hanson, M.P. for Skeena, yesterday voted with the government in favor of the trade pact between Canada and the Irish Free State because of his regard for the right of minorities.

His view was that he was obliged to support this agreement because it was the first time in the history of trade pacts negotiated by Canada that a substantial move had been taken to recognize and to help a minority people as those of the Irish Free State were at present.

DISCUSSING MANCHURIA

GENEVA, Nov. 23:—The Manchurian question was opened this week by the League of Nations when consideration of the report of the Lytton Commission commenced.

It is expected that Great Britain and United States will find common ground for agreement in connection with Manchuria.

INVITATION REJECTED BY NAZI LEADER

BERLIN, Nov. 23:—Adolf Hitler, Nazi leader, has communicated with President Paul von Hindenburg rejecting, as being "too narrow," the terms on which he (Hitler) was invited to accept the chancellorship of Germany. Hitler is understood to have requested President von Hindenburg to advise him if any amelioration of the terms is possible. It is still considered likely that Hitler will lead a provisional government in Germany.
