CHAS. HARRISON DEFENDS ISLDS. FOR SETTLERS

Letter to Overseas Settlement Board Shows Why Graham Island Suitable.

URGES CO-OPERATION.

In answer to a circular letter sent prospective settlers on Queen Charlotte Islands by the Overseas Settlement Committee of Great Britain warning them of the hardships they are likely to endure if they decide to settle on the islands, Charles Harrison wrote the committee defending the taking of settlers there and explaining conditions. His letter follows:

To say the least, I was surprised when I read the copy of your communication that is being sent to the parties we have interested in the development of Graham Island, one of the Q. C. Group. I have lived so long in a free country that I cannot understand why you take so much trouble to interfere with a first-class body of settlers that are badly wanted out there. Why you and your committee should try to block our endeavors when we neither ask nor expect to receive any financial assistance from your department for the first lot of settlers who (despite all your efforts to the contrary) intend to go out in the spring under the supervision of Drs. Dunn and Lawson, is what I cannot fully understand. One would naturally think that you and your committee would only be too glad to assist us in getting rid of some of the surplus population instead of acting otherwise.

Will Get Americans.

Your letter to the intending settlers we have secured in my opinion is based on false reasoning from beginning to end. You absolutely know nothing about the islands but what you have either read or heard, and we from practical knowledge and experience know the conditions and the advantages of the islands thoroughly. You acknowledge the mild climate and the agricultural land, but go on to state that the "population is small"; for this very reason we are desirous of increasing that "small population" by getting as many settlers to locate there as we possibly can, and if you go out of your way to prevent us getting suitable Britishers we shall get Americans.

Stipendiary Magistrate Mallory no later than Nov. 25, wrote saying "we have very fine weather, flowers are in bloom and birds singing. In Vancouver they have had a very heavy fall of snow which stopped all traffic, etc." In regard to intending settlers going there he says, "we could very easily get one hundred families located and ready for working and developing their holdings by April 1." This man is the Government authority in the district where we desire to locate our men and he himself offers to get them suitable locations.

Many Went to War.

There is no need again to refer to the agricultural possibilities of the island, as the Islanders have twice captured the silver cup for the fine display of fruits, vegetables and flowers at the Prince Rupert Exhibition. I must, however, inform you that from the Massett district alone according to our population we



sent more to the "Front" than any other part of Canada, namely 130, so you see prior to the war and the general industrial unrest throughout the world our population was not so small after all, as we had at that time sufficient voters on the "list" to cause an investigation to be made by the Provincial Government regarding the suitability of granting the islands a member of their own in the Legislative Assembly. Judge Morrison was the commissioner and he visited every important settlement on the islands and reported to the Government. Many of our "boys" went "West" or were seriously injured in the defence of the honor and freedom of the Empire, and their homesteads are falling into ruins and the land they once cultivated growing wild again. The men we have secured will doubtless buy these properties at their full valuation and thereby assist financially the widows and the orphans and those who are no longer able to do a laborious day's work. When the war commenced our "boys" volunteered, they did not wait to be conscripted, and nothing at that time in this country was too good for them; but now the scene has changed, for you refuse to assist us who are endeavoring to again populate these good lands with a good body of sturdy settlers to take the place of those who are no longer with us. I call this cheap patriotism.

Settlers' Conveniences.

You state also, "only those who care nothing for the conveniences—daily posts, daily papers, cinemas, etc. are likely to be contented on Graham Island." This statement alone convinces me that you and your committee know very little about practical clearing of land in a new country, and probably nothing at all, and if so are not capable of giving sound advice to practical men as to what they require and should really have to be contented. To enlighten you and your committee in regard to

homesteaders and pre-emptors generally, I may say that good practical men care very little for such "conveniences" until they have made their land revenue producing and able to support them. Take the farmers in some parts of this country, have they got daily papers, daily posts, cinemas, etc? Yet once a week the mail steamer brings the daily and weekly papers, letters and such things to Massett, and there is no difficulty at any time in getting to the cinemas at Prince Rupert to see a good reel, as the residents own several good petrol and oil vessels capable of going to the city any day in the year.

We also have a telegraph and telephone office in each principal settlement, and telephone communication with every settlement big or small on the islands, also three wireless stations enable us to get daily (if required) the news of the great events that occur in any part of the world. One of the wireless stations is in Massett Inlet and another about 50 miles from Massett; the third is on Moresby Island and a great convenience for the settlers there. These wireless stations are in touch by telegraph and telephone with every settlement, so you see that the settlers are not so isolated as you would lead our intending settlers to imagine they would be. Great difference to the time when we received the mail twice yearly, and to the time not so very long ago when we had to pay the carrier one shilling for every letter we sent away and the same for every letter he brought to us.

Cinemas and Newspapers. When we get our population increased as we are now trying to do, we shall have our own cinemas as we had some time ago; also our newspapers, as prior to the war there were three printed weekly on the islands. In my former letter to you I stated distinctly that at Massett the settlers could obtain all the social amenities they have been accustomed to in this country, and I go further and say that the social amenities out there are greater than any I have seen in this country, and it is in the vicinity of Massett that we intend to locate the first party.

I am the Pioneer Settler of the Islands and was once asked when visiting Ottawa why I didn't set out and live elsewhere, so as to save the Government officials a little extra work, and apparently this is the case here with the officials of your board, as they seem to be doing their best to prevent anyone going there. I firmly believe that with farmers and woodmen the islands will rapidly come into their own as a valuable asset of the province.

You also make another misleading statement that "the best that those who face the difficulties and the isolation could look forward to would be to make enough to support themselves and their families." How many farmers in this country have made their fortunes, yet thousands are well-to-do and contented. So also on the islands we have several who in eight or nine years can now be classified as well-to-do and contented.

Demand for Produce. You further say "it is difficult to dispose of produce." Last year 10,000 pounds of butter alone were imported to the islands, and I say that under proper management there is no difficulty in disposing of all products raised to mining camps, the fisheries, logging-camps and sawmills within a radius of 100 miles of Massett, and I will leave the issue to the settlers themselves to judge between your statement and mine.
