One of the prettiest and smartest of the season's weddings took place last evening at St. Mary's Church, Oak Bay, when Dorothy Corder daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joshua Kinham, of 1623 Belmont Avenue, became the bride of Major Sydney Johnston, M.C., of Prince Rupert, the ceremony being performed by Colonel the Rev. G. H. Andrews, in the presence of a large number of friends of the bride and groom, both of whom are native born British Columbians.

Picture of Loveliness
 The bride, as she walked down the aisle of the church leaning on the arm of her brother, Mr. Rowland Kinham, who gave her in marriage, was a picture of loveliness in her handsome wedding gown of white satin charmeuse, draped with georgette and having a long double train falling from the shoulders. The handsomely embroidered net veil was artistically caught to the coiffure with a wreath of orange blossoms and the bridal bouquet was composed of pink and white opelia roses and maiden hair fern.
