Mayor Rochester reported at last night's council meeting that the poles for the Graham Avenue street lights had been shipped from Terrace yesterday.

James Butterworth, who has been appointed judge of the court of revision and appeal at Athol, succeeds Jules Eggert, father of Dr. Eggert, of this city, who has resigned.

The current issue of the B. C. Gazette records the appointment of Rev. S. Spencer Peat to be issuer of marriage licenses at Bella Coola. The Gazette also announces the acceptance of the resignation of S. P. McMorde as police magistrate in this city.

The invitation of the school board requesting the city council and the fire chief to visit the Booth Memorial School to witness a fire drill proving that fire escapes are not necessary was laid on the table for the consideration of the 1922 council at the meeting last night.

Rev. J. F. Dimmick, formerly Methodist minister here but now stationed at Victoria, addressed the Young People of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church in the capital on Friday night. Mr. Dimmick also presided at a Methodist and Presbyterian Union Church mission service on Thursday night.

On recommendation of the Finance Committee, the city council last night decided to sell to J. Unwin lots 90 and 81, block 20, section 2, for \$350. These lots were put up at the last municipal tax sale but no bid was made on them to cover the amount of delinquent taxes, \$420. The committee made the recommendation considering that it was good policy to get the lots off the city's hands even if the upset price was not realized. Mr. Unwin intends to start a poultry yard on the property.


