## TORCHBEARER IN EDUCATION

Work of Sir William C. Macdonald Told About in Magazine.

The educational work done by the late Sir William C. Macdonald is the subject of an article in Every Woman's World for February. It says in part:

Of Sir William Macdonald's service to higher education it is sufficient to say here that he gave over \$6,000,000 to McGill University proper. An equivalent sum went to the foundation, equipment and endowment of Macdonald College at Ste Anne de Bellevue, Quebec, a department of McGill with three distinct schools—of agriculture, of domestic science and for the training of teachers. The first of the three fulfills for the province of Quebec the function performed for Ontario by the Agricultural College at Guelph. In order that the latter might be rounded out in conformity with his theories of rural education Sir William provided, at a cost of nearly \$200,000, the Macdonald Institute, consisting of two buildings for the teaching of domestic science and manual training respectively.

The effect of the work of the College at Ste Anne and the Institute at Guelph upon the welfare of the people of the two provinces is generally recognized and not a little of the qualifying prosperity and the improved standards of living in the country parts of Ontario and Quebec can be traced directly to their operation and their influence.

### Towns and Cities.

It was in the middle nineties, the period in which he presented to McGill the splendid group of buildings which house the Faculty of Applied Science, that Sir William's desire to effect an improvement in the rural schools of Canada led him for help in the way of plan-making and administration. Dr. Robertson, who was first principal of Ste Anne College, was later in the service of the Federal Government and is now the chief commissioner of Boy Scouts for Canada, advised as a first step the establishment of manual training centres in the elementary schools of towns and cities to which the country people looked for guidance. Sir William demurred at first, saying that the urban schools were already too good in comparison with those of the country, but he finally admitted the cogency of Dr. Robertson's argument that the country would copy the city's example if the experiment were successful. He furnished the funds to establish manual training centres in the public schools of twenty-one cities and towns, extending from Prince Edward Island to British Columbia, and to maintain them for three years, twenty-seven special teachers were brought in, mostly from England, and they trained others. By 1904 the local authorities on the several provinces had taken over and extended the work which has been retained as an important part of their school systems.

### HOW LUGGAGE THIEVES OPERATE IN LONDON

Two classes of luggage thieves operate at the London railway stations. The opportunist, a criminal, is always on the lookout, and depends largely on his skill in estimating the financial position of the person he intends to victimize. Another class carefully plans the coup in advance. For example, a Brighton woman, who had travelled by Pullman to Victoria, had two cases of luggage deposited on the platform by a porter when an elderly man who had travelled up in the same carriage, politely accosted her, and said that she had forgotten her muff. Actually she had no muff, but she was sufficiently impressed to return to the Pullman to see if she had left anything behind. When she returned her luggage had gone. It appears that during the owner's absence the cases were taken to a taxicab by a porter in good faith, and an elderly man dressed in a dark overcoat and a velvet hat promptly got in and told the driver to go to Victoria street. When the driver asked for the number he impatiently told him to go on, saying he would tell him where to pull up. Yet another dodge of the luggage thief is to cut the straps holding luggage to the back of a motor-car, and to pick up the packages as they fall. Some luggage thieves are known to have motor-cars at their disposal for such operations.
