## WORKLESS MEETING TROY FOR GOVERNOR

Relief Matters Discussed Last Night —Ald. Casey is Speaker

World conditions constituted the chief topic of discussion at the weekly meeting last night of the National Unemployed Workers' Association. There was a large attendance and a number of new speakers made their debut.

A motion was passed asking the city council to deduct from the hours required to work time which relief workers used in procuring fuel now that the six-hour day was in effect.

Many members took part in a discussion as to the alleged inadequacy of relief being issued. For those patronizing restaurants it was claimed that the allowance was sufficient for only one whole-some meal per day. Prices of commodities had also increased considerably of late in northern districts, it was asserted. It was very difficult for many to make the \$2.80 per week last out without going short of many necessities.

Fifty-one hunting licences had been allowed the association by the Game Board, it was reported, but so far, only 32 had been claimed by members. The central committee was instructed to interview the local game warden as to the possession of deer meat after the closing of the season.

Ald. George B. Casey addressed the meeting and gave an outline of the situation in which the city now found itself.

Charles Chapman presided over the meeting.

Connors, Democratic national committeeman for Alaska. It is believed in political circles here that all party leaders will support the nomination of Mr. Troy.

After the regular business session last night, the Moose Lodge threw the meeting open for a debate on the merits of capital punishment. D. C. Schubert and Percy Cameron argued in favor of capital punishment and J. Jeans and W. B. McCallum against.

Many interesting points were brought out during one hour and fifteen minutes of argument, the judges giving the decision on points to the affirmative debaters.

A popular vote of the audience taken before closing the meeting also gave the decision to the affirmative.

Judges were Ole Stegavik, Ted Rorvik and Fred Scadden. J. M. Morrison presided as chairman of the entertainment.

It is the intention of the committee to arrange debates during the coming winter for all corners.

## SENATOR IS DEAD

Wesley Jones was Author of Shipping Bill Which Took Business From Rupert

Senator Wesley Livsey Jones of Seattle, who was author of the Jones Act, United States shipping bill, which diverted Alaskan shipping business some years ago from Prince Rupert to Seattle, died a few days ago in Seattle from high blood pressure. The funeral took place from First Methodist Church in Seattle with the whole community paying tribute. The body was cremated.

Senator Jones, who was unable, on account of illness, to engage actively in the election campaign, grew worse after he learned of his decisive defeat in the recent election by Homer T. Bone, Democratic candidate for senator.

During the latter part of his career as senior United States Senator from Washington, Mr. Jones achieved a reputation as a sponsor of prohibition enforcement legislation that gave him rank with former Representative Andrew J. Volstead, father of the national prohibition law.

Senator Jones became author of a law which provided a penalty of five years imprisonment or a fine of \$10,000, or both, for first violations of the dry statute.

Enactment of the measure gained for the senator widespread publicity that virtually obscured his previous legislative accomplishments, which had included the passage of the Merchant Marine acts of 1920 and 1923.

Besides the increased penalty measure, he had sponsored a "bone-dry" law for Alaska and, before the adoption of the Eighteenth Amendment, an act barring liquor advertising in dry states.

**Merchant Marine Acts**  
The two merchant marine acts

were designed to build up private-owned American shipping and encourage merchant marine operations in the country so that the government's activities in shipping would be discontinued.

During the World War Senator Jones fathered a number of laws aiding soldiers and sailors.

An advocate of the entrance of the United States into the World Court, Senator Jones by his stand on that issue gave evidence of his belief in fidelity to party principle-commerce committee.

**Long Career**  
Senator Jones had a long career in Congress, serving in the House from 1899 to 1909 and after that in the Senate for several terms. He was chairman of the important Commerce Committee.

Born at Bethany, Ill., October 9, 1863, Senator Jones was graduated at Southern Illinois College in 1886 and the same year admitted to the bar. On October 13, 1886, he married Minda Nelson of Enfield, Ill. They had a son and a daughter.

Three years after their marriage Mr. and Mrs. Jones moved to the then Territory of Washington and located at North Yakima. In 1917 they took up their residence at Seattle. His principal sport and recreation was golf.
