SPLENDID TRIP ON THE LAUNCH DOLPHIN

J. W. McAuley and Party Return From Five Hundred Mile Cruise.

The finest scenery in the whole district is at the north arm of Wark Canal, according to J. W. McAuley, foreman of the Canadian National Locomotive shops, who with a party has just returned from a cruise of the neighborhood during which he covered something like 500 miles in his fine little launch Dolphin. They went to Wark Canal, Klutzmateen Inlet, Port Simpson, and southward around Poreher Island, Macauley Island and Pitt Island. In the course of the trip they saw two bears but had few adventures. The party consisted of Mr. McAuley's son Jack, daughter Muriel and Mrs. T. Priest, Miss Stephen and Fred Richmond.

Wonderful Scenery.

Speaking of the trip Mr. McAuley said there was no scenery he had seen anywhere equal to that on the north arm of Wark Canal. Mountains rose sheer for several thousand feet from the water's edge and there were snow capped ridges and waterfalls and all the combinations that make for fine scenery.

At Klutzmateen Inlet there was a glacier right at the water's edge. This inlet is northward from Wark Canal but is not as picturesque.

To the southward they visited the Salt Lakes on Poreher Inlet north of Kitkatla. They saw the totem at the Indian village and generally enjoyed life in the open camping wherever the fancy suited them.
