REVOLT AT SOVIET REGIME TURKESTAN

Government Industries Prove to be Unprofitable; Enver Pasha Leads Revolt.

MOSCOW, Aug. 17. — Far greater concessions toward a complete capitalistic state of affairs than prevail in Russia proper have just been made by the Soviet government in Turkestan.

The Turkestan economic council decided to remove all regulations and previous decrees which restrained trade and commerce and to retain control only of a very few "key industries." Turkestan is normally one of the largest cotton growing regions of the world.

The decision came as a result of two factors—first, the unprofitableness of government controlled industries, and second, the unrest among the population due to the revolt against the Soviet regime which is being led in Bokhara by Enver Pasha, formerly commander-in-chief of the Turkish armies.

Cotton growing has increased greatly during the past few years. The pre-war area sown with cotton in Russian middle Asia was nearly 400,000 desatines. In 1924 about 100,000 desatines were sown, and this year, in Turkestan, without Bokhara and Khiva, where the Enver Pasha revolt is stronger than in Turkestan, only 63,000 desatines were sown. This is expected to yield about 15,000 tons of cotton. To transport this to the Russian factories about 20 trillion Soviet rubles will be required by the Turkestan cotton committee. The state bank has assigned only one trillion, and though ten trillion more are to be forthcoming, much of this cotton will remain in Turkestan unless private enterprise moves it. The railway conditions are also unfavorable for its transport.

German Rum Runners Do Business on High Seas.

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 16. — Legislation in Sweden against drunkenness and consequent heavy taxation on liquor and beer has resulted in very high prices for alcohol of every kind. So much so that smuggling of drink into Sweden has developed all along the coast, and it is asserted that about 5,000 gallons from the Baltic are landed and sold in Sweden every day.

Recently a German ship was said to be anchored outside territorial waters with a cargo of spirits for sale. In order to establish the truth of this alleged rum-running, the correspondent of the Associated Press decided upon a personal investigation. With a friend he embarked on a six ton cutter for this German boat, which was expected off Sandham, and after a pleasant sail in the moonlight came up with the vessel which was riding at anchor with the usual lights showing.

Cordial Welcome.

On hailing the vessel we were requested to go aboard and were received cordially by the Captain. "Just waiting for somebody else," he said, "but you are very welcome anyhow." Asked down to the cabin, the visitors explained they were neither buyers of alcohol nor in the service of the customs, but only wanted to learn something first hand about selling spirits on the high seas.

man, about 30 years old. "You take me for a smuggler," he said, "or bootlegger out for business beyond the law, but you are quite mistaken. My name is Ludwig Wolff, formerly of the German navy. I do no business which cannot bear examination, and would not for anything in the world infringe on the privileges of Sweden. I am in international waters and am entitled to trade here as much as I wish with anybody who wants to do business with me. I can offer you the purest and best whiskies English and American at about \$1.25 a quart. I have the best Danish schnaps for three krona a bottle, and many thousand bottles of German Brandy."

Made 500 Per Cent.

Wolff, referring to himself, explained that he had been paid off from the navy when the armistice was declared, and on hearing of the liquor trade with Norway, he decided to join in. "I am not dealing for my own account," he said; "this business is organized in Hamburg by big capitalists. Liquor in Germany is very cheap and Scandinavian currency very high, so we sell much cheaper than do registered dealers ashore, the profit for us is nearly 500 per cent." He added he expected to get rid of his present cargo within a week and return for more. He made ten trips last year to Norway, and with the same number to Sweden this year he expects to clean up enough for a five years' rest.

UNEMPLOYMENT IN SWEDEN DECREASES

Only 83,000 Now Registered and New Work to be Done

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 17. — Sweden seems to be approaching a successful solution of her unemployment problem. It has been one of the most difficult that the country had to deal with of late years, and only recently has the government clearly seen light ahead in this troublesome situation.

According to the latest official report of the Government Unemployment Commission, the total number of unemployed in Sweden is now under 83,000 which is less than one-half of the figure recorded at the beginning of this year. About one hundred individual provincial communities have reported a complete cessation of unemployment, while the general demand for labor shows a decided increase. The government expenses for relief work during the first five months of this year amount to about 31,000,000 kronor, but owing to the rapid reduction in the number of men without work, considerable savings are expected.

Placing Orders

The unemployment situation will be further relieved in the near future by the placing of government contracts for 27,000,000 kronor with various industries. The state railroads are going to place large orders for rolling stock, signalling apparatus, structural steel work for bridges and other reconstruction work. The Waterfalls Board will apply several millions of kronor toward continued electrification, the construction of power stations, and canal repair work, while the Department of Communications will order new telegraph cables and construct new lines.

Minister of Finance Thorson, in a recent speech, said that even when Swedish industries reach the 1914 level of activity there will be about 10,000 supernumerary workers for whom employment must be found, chiefly in agriculture. To meet this situation preliminary work is now being done for establishing agricultural colonies for the unemployed, and the back-to-the-soil project, the minister said, will be one of the main questions for next year's Riksdag to settle.
