FISHING FLEETS EASTERN BANKS

French and Portuguese Vessels Now Crossing Atlantic for Season

HALIFAX, N.S., June 5. — The European fishing fleets coming to take cod this season on the banks off the coast of Canada and Newfoundland will, it is reported, be larger than in any year since the war. Many of the vessels of the French Metropolitan fleet are now on their way across the Atlantic, and they will be followed within a week or two by the Portuguese fleet.

The French fleet will number over a hundred sailing craft and thirty odd steam trawlers. In the six years preceding the war France sent across the Atlantic an average of 226 sailing vessels to the fishing, while the Island of St. Pierre outfitted a local fleet averaging 43 sail. The number of steam trawlers crossing from France increased during the same six years from eight to twenty-five.

While the number of steam trawlers shows a decline the total tonnage of these craft has not been greatly decreased, as small trawlers have been replaced by larger craft. The Island of St. Pierre, which some years ago owned a big fleet of sailing vessels suitable for bank fishing has practically abandoned the old style of fishing, and now its people use motor boats, and confine their efforts to shore fishing.

While the sailing craft of the French fleet make St. Pierre their base of operation the steam trawlers call frequently at North Sydney and Louisburg, N.S., for fuel and supplies. The favorite fishing ground of the French trawlers is the southern part of the Grand Banks, while the French sail craft favor the vicinity of the Virgin Rock.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class and reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not being used for such purposes.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption.

Where pre-emptor in occupation of land for at least one year, and has made improvements, he may be cause of ill-health, or other cause, be granted a certificate of occupancy, and pre-emptor must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least one acre before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation of land for 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may be cause of ill-health, or other cause, be granted a certificate of occupancy, and pre-emptor must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least one acre before receiving Crown Grant.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$50 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvement of \$10 per acre, including a cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor of Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions of at least 2 years are required.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 400 acres may be leased by one person or company, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land. Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased, conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows, inaccessible by existing roads, may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road or them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 25, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of allied forces, or devisees thereof, direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole or original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

this year will probably number about sixty sail, an increase of 100 per cent since 1919. The Portuguese work only on the Grand Bank, mostly north of the Virgin Rock.

Many of the Canadian fishing vessels are now returning from Quebeareu, Middle Ground, Sable Island and other lesser banks, and are fitting out for the midsummer trip to the Grand Banks, which is their principal trip.
