The New Method Coal Co., which was recently organized in Vancouver by M. Aivazoff, in handling coal from the Nanaimo mines offering as an inducement a metal arrangement for use in stoves and furnaces by which it is claimed a saving of 25 per cent. is effected in fuel and smoke consumed. The new company has built a coal shed 15 by 70 feet at the G.T.P. dock in Vancouver.
