GUSTAVO WILL WRESTLE AGAIN

Matched for Finish Bout with
Tiny Walker from Ketchikan
Next Week.

Promoters Jack Judge and Roy Barnes announce that Ad. Gustavo, the Argentine middleweight champion wrestler, has been matched with Tiny Walker, from Ketchikan, for a finish match (two falls out of three), to take place in the Empress Theatre next Wednesday evening as a Fair Week fixture.

In bringing these two together a lively encounter is expected—one that will equal if not excel the one last week between Gustavo and Jack Olsen which proved so successful. It will not be the first meeting of Gustavo and Walker for they met last July 4 at Ketchikan, the latter winning by the only fall of the match.

Walker has been on the Pacific Coast for the past year or so and hails from the Eastern States. He claims that he has not been thrown once since coming West. His record is a good one and includes matches with such men as Tom Ray, George Barnes, Ted Thye, Ira Dern and Mike Yokel, several of whom claim the middleweight championship of the world.

Walker's weight is 160 pounds as against Gustavo's 165 so they are pretty evenly matched on that score.

The fact that Walker has won over Gustavo only will tend to make the match more popular among local fans on account of the great account the latter gave of himself against Olsen last week.
