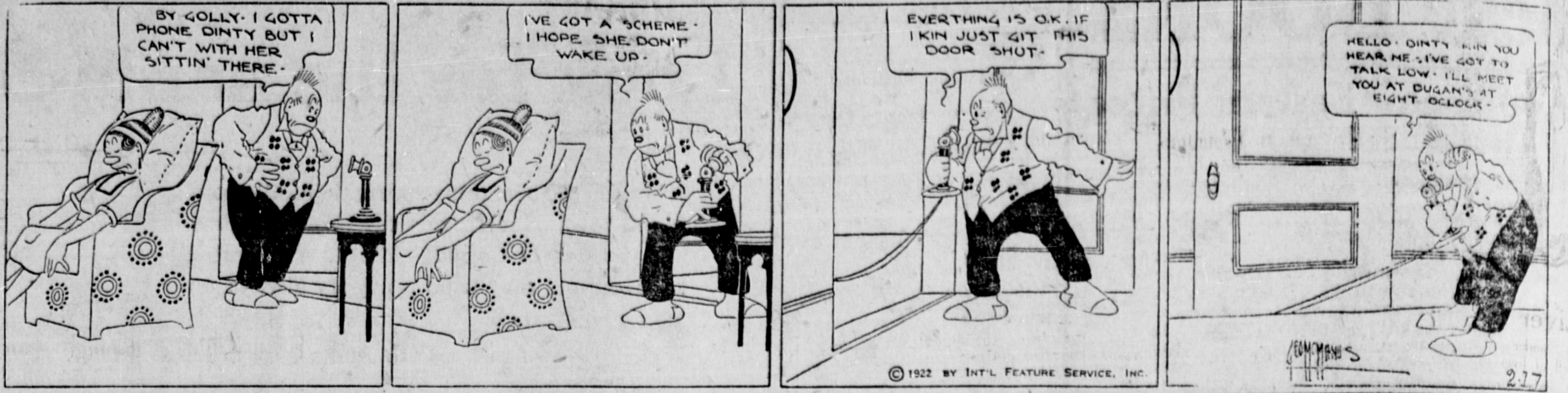

BRINGING UP FATHER



"SHEIK" IS VERY SPECTACULAR

Wonderful Scenes in Photoplay to Be Seen Tonight at Westholme.

One of the most impressive features of "The Sheik," George Melford's latest production for Paramount, which comes to the Westholme Theatre tonight, are the many magnificent and spectacular settings in which the various scenes are enacted. These include:

This vision establishes the haughty, dominant character of the girl, who insists upon taking a journey into the desert, despite her brother's objections.

FORMER RUPERT MAN TABLES REPORT ON ALBERTA TELEPHONES

Hon. V. W. Smith, Minister in the Farmer Government, Produces Document in Legislature.

EDMONTON, Feb. 24.—Alberta's publicly owned telephone system is credited with assets totalling \$22,898,223.33 in the annual report of the department tabled in the legislature by Hon. V. W. Smith, minister in charge. Against this there is a bonded debt of \$21,406,880.95, together with a replacement reserve of \$660,299.09, a sinking fund of \$459,767.25 and accrued surplus earning not yet transferred to reserve of \$129,741.

Nearly one thousand cities, towns, villages and hamlets are now linked up with the provincial system. The total subscriber's lines in operation are 49,517, of which 15,028 are in the northern and 34,489 in the southern division. Calgary has 15,669 subscribers, Lethbridge 1963 and Medicine Hat 1693. Some 6084 rural applicants are on file awaiting service. In the rural branch 2050 miles of poles were added during the year and 4449 new subscribers served. Long distance lines were extended by 482 miles of poles and 6524 miles of wire. The new automatic exchange at North Hill, Calgary, with 1150 subscribers was com-
