NELSON MAKES HUGE PROFITS AT LOW COST

 a 10% discount for prompt pay-
 ment.

Business Rates
 Our business rates run from
 10c per K.H. to 1c per K.H., there
 being a reduction of 1c per 100
 K.H. up to 6000 K.H.

This rate is also subject to a
 10% discount.

Small Power Users
 For small power users, 5c per
 K.H. to 3c per K.H. less 20% dis-
 count.

Large Power Users
 Large power users like the
 Canadian Pacific Railway, 1c per
 K.H., less 10%.

Now let us consider the water
 department. During the year 1921
 Nelson paid for the maintenance
 of its water department \$3,794.23
 which according to the Municipal
 Inspector's report Prince Rupert
 was \$46,175.74. Nelson's re-
 ceipts for 1921 from water were
 \$30,296.34. While Prince Rupert's
 receipts were \$34,285.03. Ac-
 cording to the Municipal Inspec-
 tor's report Nelson made a net
 profit of \$25,771.94 on its water
 department during the year 1921,
 while Prince Rupert had a deficit
 of \$22,824.43. This comparison
 again takes interest in the sink-
 ing fund into account which does
 not seem to be necessary in this
 particular comparison.

Now as to our city staffs. In
 the City Hall we have three men
 and two stenographers. In the
 streets department we have one
 engineer, five regular employees
 with an average during the sum-
 mer of ten men, and this year, of
 course we let a lot of macadam-
 izing by contract. In the electri-
 cal department, one engineer, six
 men at the hydro-electric plant,
 three men at the sub-station,
 three linemen, one meter reader,
 who also reads the gas meters.
 At the gas plant we have five men.
 On the street railway we have a
 force of nine men, including men
 at the car barn as well as men on
 the cars. On the police force we
 have three men, and the health
 department one. We have one
 city collector. In connection with
 the incinerator and scavenging
 department we have two men. In
 the fire department six men, and
 the water department two men. I
 purposely divided them up into
 their several departments so that
 one could see at a glance which
 are inside men and which are out-
 side men so as to make the com-
 parison easy.

I believe in having an efficient
 and well paid staff, on the other
 hand there seems to be a general
 tendency throughout the west to
 try and run our small towns on
 the same scale as the eastern
 cities are run, and which by ne-
 cessity creates an overhead cost
 which materially affects the tax
 rate which is already too high in
 all British Columbia municipalities.

ACTIVITY IN TIMBER LINE

Deputy Minister of Lands Naden
 Says More is Going on at
 Prince George This
 Winter

George R. Naden, deputy min-
 ister of lands, returned to the
 city last night after having spent
 a few days at Prince George. He
 will remain in the city until Fri-
 day morning when he will go
 south on the Prince George.

Speaking of activities around
 Prince George, Mr. Naden said
 that logging and tie-cutting ac-
 tivities were rather larger this
 year than last. A Cranbrook
 concern has taken over Barney
 Keegan's interest near the city
 and is preparing to move a saw-
 mill plant in there to start cut-
 ting this spring. There have
 been no new developments in
 connection with the J. D. Mc-
 Arthur mill right in Prince
 George, but Mr. McArthur is ex-
 pected there shortly when he will
 likely make further announce-
 ments in connection with his
 plans. It is expected he will at
 least establish the sawmill and
 it is possible he may go into the
 timber business there even more
 extensively than that.

Mr. Naden spoke of his son
 Jack and daughter Esther who
 are well known among the
 younger folk of this city. Jack
 is continuing his medical stud-
 ies at Toronto and has two more
 years to take up before he will
 graduate as a doctor. Miss
 Naden is at present in the Gen-
 eral Hospital at Vancouver,
 finishing up practical work be-
 fore completing her last year at
 university before graduating as a
 Bachelor of Science.
