**FREIGHTER LOSES TWO RAILWAY CARS**  
 Coaches For Alaska Road Swept Overboard From Deck of Latouche in Gulf Blow

SEWARD, Jan. 3.—Two standard, combination, steel mail and express cars, destined for the Alaska Railroad here were swept overboard from the deck of the Alaska Steamship Company's freighter Latouche in the Gulf of Alaska recently in a heavy blow, according to information reaching here. As soon as the big cars were lost the Latouche notified nearby radio stations.  
 The two steel coaches were loaded on deck and chained firmly into position. Her position at the time the cars were carried away was given as latitude 58.18 and longitude 138.13, or approximately 60 miles west of Cape Spencer.  
 The coaches were part of some new equipment recently purchased by the Alaskan Engineering Commission for immediate use on the Alaska Railway between Seward and Nenana.

**SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS**

Minimum price of first-class and reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.  
 Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.  
 Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.  
 Partnership pre-emption abolished but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.  
 Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.  
 Where pre-emptor in occupation of less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, by reason of ill-health, or other cause, be granted a temporary certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.  
 Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$50 per acre, and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained after this 3 years, and improvements of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 3 years are required.  
 Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he occupies land in connection with his farm without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.  
 Unsurveyed areas not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.  
 For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.  
 Mill, factory or industrial sites on trapper land not exceeding 10 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.  
 Natural features inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Relief of one-half cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.  
**PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.**  
 The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons engaged in serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war. This privilege is also made retroactive, relating to pre-emptions due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918 (taxes are required for five years).  
 Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 1, 1914, in account of payments for fees on soldiers' pre-emptions.  
 Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces who have acquired direct or indirect, remitted from an instalment to March 31, 1920.  
**SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS**  
 Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.  
**GRAZING**  
 Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

**WILL ATTEMPT TO PREVENT ALBERTA DOUBLE HANGING**

MONTREAL, Jan. 3.—Strong opposition to the hanging of women was expressed at a board meeting of the Canadian Prisoners' Welfare Association, at which Robert Bickersdike, former member for St. Lawrence, Montreal presided.  
 Attention was called by the committee which handles capital cases to that of Emile Picarillo and Florence Lasandra. It was pointed out that no women had paid capital penalty in Canada for thirteen years and in England for fifteen years, although in latter country there are now three under sentence of death. A cable was ordered sent to the home secretary in that connection.  
 The meeting decided to circulate petitions in favor of legislation for abolition of capital penalty this session, but in the meantime urged that as long as state killing exists there should be no secret executions as recently took place at Vermont, N.S., soon after the New Brunswick execution had been bungled.  
 With regard to the Picarillo-Lasandra case, the board felt that clemency should be exercised for the couple and will urge this on the governor-general.

**NORTH POLE IN NEW LOCATION**

Earth is Wobbling on Its Axis and Greenland is Moving Westward  
 LONDON, Jan. 2.—The earth is wobbling on its axis, according to Colonel P. Jensen, the Danish scientist who returned recently from a degree measuring expedition into Greenland. He reports that Greenland is moving westward at the rate of 20 yards a year. This seems to confirm the recent reports of surprising climatic changes at the North Pole.  
 It is now established that there is a periodic shifting of the latitude of the North Pole. The movement is difficult to detect because of the small area of the Pole—about the size of a tennis court. Some authorities say that the poles are gradually changing their positions, and that this alteration to the world's axis will in time mean that regions which are at present ice-bound will become warm and habitable countries.

**MACKENZIE RETURNS**

Visit of Old Timer From South Recalls Famous Trek From Manson Creek  
 Among the passengers from the south this morning was George McKenzie, of Los Angeles, and formerly of the Bulkley Valley, who is on his way to Burns Lake on business. He is an old timer and is well known to all residents of the interior.  
 Old timers recall a famous tramp of McKenzie's when he packed out a sack of coal from Manson Creek to Port Essington over twenty years ago. Manson Creek is two or three hundred miles east of Hazelton. McKenzie froze his feet on the trail and was pretty much all in when he reached his destination.

S. J. Willis, superintendent of education, has advised D. G. Tate, city clerk, that the Prince George schools having passed the daily average attendance of 250 the city had created a city school district of the second class and the board of school trustees will now be composed of five trustees instead of three.

Three women have been sentenced to terms of six months each in Okalla prison for violation of the Liquor Act here recently. The information was secured by Constables Dixon and Harrison, special operatives of the Board, Mrs. Phyllis Winn, Jewel Murray and Mrs. Mary Granston were the offenders. Bail was set at \$1000 in each case and appeals will be entered, it is stated.
