The Union S.S. Venture arrived at 7:30 a.m. from Vancouver with a general shipment of freight. She leaves tonight at 6 p.m. for the south.

The fire brigade answered the last fire call of 1924 at 11 a.m. Sunday. A chimney fire in the residence of B. Stockdale on Borden Street was the cause of the alarm but no damage resulted.
