NEW BORN BABY IN BED WAS A STILL

Novel and Clever Attempt to Elude
Revenue Officers in Mani-
toba Fails

WINNIPEG, JAN. 13.—Efforts to pass off a small still as a new born babe failed to deceive provincial police and inland revenue officers when they raided a farmhouse at Gonor this week in search of illicit liquor.

When Inspector T. W. Hammond of the Inland Revenue Department and Constables Foss, Forbes and De Gruney of the provincial police searched the house of Frank Donoski, at Gonor, they failed to locate the still which they had reason to suppose was there. A systematic search of the house availed nothing until officers became suspicious of the baby which Mrs. Donoski had in bed with her. She claimed it was a two-day-old baby, but the strange quietness of the infant caused Inspector Hammond to put his hand on it. As he did so, Mrs. Donoski threw the contents of a cup of water in his face. The "babe" proved to be a still of 10-gallon capacity.

points on the continent. The popularity of the airways among tourists during the last summer has led to plans for routes to be opened in the spring by which London will be connected by air with all of the principal points within 500 miles.

Special trips at a rate of about eight cents per mile, which will be made by a fleet of planes plying daily to Scotland, Ireland, France, Denmark and Luxembourg, is one form of projected enterprise. Five planes are now making eight trips daily between London and Paris carrying on an average three persons each trip and the lines to Rotterdam, Brussels and Antwerp are doing a capacity business.

BIRTH CONTROL BEING CONSIDERED BY JAPAN

TOKIO, Japan, Jan. 15.—A Committee to investigate the advisability of the practice of birth control in Japan has been appointed by a group of graduate physicians of Tokyo University, following an investigation by some of the doctors since the visit to Japan of Mrs. Margaret Sanger, American birth control advocate.

Dr. Nakahara, of Keio University, has submitted reports of his investigations, stating that birth control would promote the welfare of Japan and that the increase of weak people means ruin of the state.

FLEW TOO LOW AND FINED FIVE DOLLARS

EPPING, Essex, Jan. 15.—The first case under the Air Navigation Act was heard in the police court here when an aviator was summoned for flying too low over the town. He was convicted and fined £1. The police witness said that the accused flew at a terrific speed, looped the loop and rolled so low that his biplane nearly crashed into the roof of a grocery store. The aviator pleaded that he had flown over eighty towns and had carried 10,000 passengers without accident.

SEASON TICKETS ON BRITISH AIR LINE

LONDON, Jan. 15.—"Season" tickets are now being issued on Britain's first inland airway between London and Manchester. The price is £100 and a ticket covers fifty flights between the two cities, including the motor car journey between Grosvenor aerodrome and the City. Several firms in the northern city have bought tickets, which will enable them to send their representatives to London at a moment's notice.

A FALSE NOTE

A British tar, home on leave and celebrating the occasion, had got himself into a dilemma. He had hired a taxi, only to discover when approaching his destination that he was penniless. He had dined and wine, not wisely, but too well. But the British navy is a training school of resourcefulness. He caught up the speaking tube, shouted "Stop!" and jumped out. "I just want to pop into this tobacconist's and get some matches," he explained to the driver. "I've dropped a pound note somewhere in the cab and can't find it in the dark." He entered the tobacconist's, and as he did so the cab and its driver vanished into the night, as he had anticipated. —The Argonaut.

GERMANY BANS ALL LARGE BRITISH PLANES

Popular Mode of Travel to and From Cologne May Cease

LONDON, Jan. 13.—Some concern is being caused by the action of the German Government refusing to allow British commercial aircraft above a certain size to fly over their borders, as this action means the closing down of the aerial mail and passenger service now running between London and Cologne every day. This has been a popular mode of travel and lately the rush has been so great that two air liners had to be put into service instead of one. Under the Treaty of Versailles, Germany has the right to ban foreign aircraft after Jan. 1, 1923, and she is taking advantage of this provision. One British concern, it is understood, has come to an understanding with the Germans by which they will run their ten seater machines right through to Berlin from London in the coming year.

DEPARTMENT OF LANDS. NOTICE.

Application for Grazing Permits For The Season of 1923.

Applications for permits to graze livestock on the Crown Range within each grazing district of the Province of British Columbia, must be filed with the District Forester at Cranbrook, Fort St. John, Kamloops, Nelson, Prince Rupert, Williams Lake, Vancouver and Vernon, or with the Commissioner of Grazing, Parliament Buildings, Victoria, B.C., on or before March 15th, 1923.

Blank forms upon which to submit applications may be obtained from District Foresters at the above named places, or from the Department of Lands at Victoria, B.C.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Partnership pre-emption abolished but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5% before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation for less than 5 years, and has made no improvements, he may be granted a temporary certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be leased, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year.

Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title will be obtained in record 2 years after improvements of \$1000 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his former land without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, but to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural gas measures inaccessible on existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road not exceeding half of purchase price is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving in the armed forces of the Crown. The one with which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for the land under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the great war.

This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emption are due or payable by holders on pre-emption recorded after June 26, 1918.

Taxes are remitted for five years, accrued, due and been paid since August 1, 1914, on account of payments, less taxes on sales, pre-emption.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or domestic, accounted direct or indirect, remitted from settlement to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.
Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.
Grazing Act, 1912, for systematic development of livestock industry provided for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner.

Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranked, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
