AGRICULTURAL ASSOCIATION GEN. MEETING

Financial Condition is Good One: Retiring Board Thanked For Services

The annual meeting of the Northern British Columbia Agricultural and Industrial Association was held last night, W. E. Thompson, vice-president, in the chair in the absence of F. G. Dawson, president.

The annual financial report audited by R. H. Shockey, was presented and showed a good financial position with a balance of \$193 in the bank.

Mr. Thompson spoke of the permanency of much of the work done at the building this year and suggested that the incoming board work along the same lines. It would take very little money now to complete the rest rooms. A complete resume of the work had been prepared by Manager Venables which would be a great help to next year's board. There were also complete files that could be referred to for comparison.

Mr. Shockey made a number of comparisons between the expenditures and income of last year and that immediately preceding. The donations last year had fallen off about \$900. He complimented the board on the good showing made.

Uniform System

Mr. Venables suggested that a uniform system of bookkeeping be adopted each year under the supervision of the auditor and also a method of segregating the receipts with a view to saving work. He would like the new board to go over the building with him and have an office conference in order that they may be helped in the work of the coming year.

A vote of thanks to the retiring board was carried with enthusiasm and acknowledged by Mr. Thompson, who spoke of the large amount of work entailed and the necessity of new members of the board making up their minds that they would have to give a good deal of time to it if they were to make it a success.

E. J. Conway, the Granby-mining engineer, paid a visit to the Esperanza mine last week.

Thirty tons of high grade ore from the Esperanza mine is now at the government wharf here

awaiting shipment to the Anyox smelter. One hundred tons of low grade will be shipped as soon as it can be hauled from the mine.

In the Letter Box

RIDLEY HOME

Editor, Daily News:

May we, through your paper, draw attention of the citizens as a whole, and especially the merchants of this city, to the fact that the Ridley Home is now permanently established in our midst, the new buildings being situated on 8th Avenue East and Conrad Street.

The Ridley Home was established in Metlakatla over thirty years ago, by the first Bishop of the diocese, the late Bishop Ridley. It was established for the express purpose, of helping the isolated settlers to procure an education for their children, by providing them a home to which they might send them, by paying a very small fee for their maintenance.

The object of the Home is the same today. Settlers are still struggling with pioneer conditions in this Northern British Columbia, scattered widely from one another, and often not sufficient children for the government to provide a school, thus the Ridley Home comes to their aid, giving them the opportunity to have their children in a good home, and with all the educational facilities of the city children for them to participate in.

Needs are Great

A small charge is made per capita, but not sufficient to meet the running expenses of the Home, because if that were done

it would not fulfil its mission, viz., the helping of those who are really in need of such a home to which they can send their children.

The needs of the Home are very great, and the board of trustees are under heavy expenses, in establishing in Prince Rupert a series of cottage homes from the materials used in the home at Metlakatla. One of these homes is now completed and ready for occupation, accommodating eight children. The matron has arrived and the children are ready to take up their residence in the home. We are therefore asking the citizens to give their heartiest cooperation in this work. We need money and provisions. Anything in the way of provisions from a bar of soap to a ton of coal will be most acceptable, and can be delivered at the home at any time, and such gifts will be duly acknowledged.

Through the courtesy of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, and Ormes Limited, we are able to place subscription lists with them, to whom all donations of monies should be sent.

We all wish to see the interior of Northern British Columbia developed. Here is an opportunity for us to do our bit. By helping the children to make good settlers, we are helping the business of our city, first of all by establishing the home here, secondly by sending back to the interior better trained boys and girls to make the future settlers of our great hinterland.
