According to well informed mariners the Caygeon is one of the best fitted three men boats in the port of Prince Rupert and you would surely think so if you went aboard. The cabin is the acme of comfort and cleanliness, and is smartly decorated in white enamel with red facings. Every available bit of space has been put to some useful purpose and even the ceiling is adorned with cute little shelves which contain a considerable part of the culinary utensils not forgetting the clothes brush.

The floor is covered with 'jig saw pattern linoleum. Two bunks are arranged permanently for the captain and first mate, both being fitted with electric light inside to enable the occupants to read at night, while the third bunk is arranged on the opposite side for the cook. The stove is of a very useful nature trimmed with polished nickel fittings which shine so brightly that a looking glass is not required, while at the side a coal bunker is rigged up at a convenient angle. The table is of a collapsible make, which can be raised and lowered at will and serves the purpose of either a mug-up stand or a billiard table. The forward part of the cabin is rigged up with fifty little cupboard doors in which reside the willow pattern cups and dishes.
