WORLD TODAY
IS REVIEWED

C. H. Heustis Lectures on World Problems at Presbyterian Church Hall

"The Challenge of the Present World Situation" was the subject of an interesting lecture given last night to a fairly good congregation in the Presbyterian Church Hall by Dr. C. H. Heustis of Red Deer, Alta. He said that all progress depended upon the forces or tendencies that were at work in a community. The only way in which the world would grow better was for the men and women in it to make it better.

Different Today

Mr. Heustis said he did not think the people realized how different the world was today from what it was in 1914. Historians looking back, he opined, would speak of this as the beginning of modern history. Great questions were demanding solution. They had to determine whether man was anything more than a fighting animal. It was said that by digging deep enough the savage could always be found beneath the veneer of civilization. The Neanderthal man, a brutal hairy creature, was the result of half a million years of development and there had been much development since that. He lived by fighting and many people today looked on fighting as the greatest thing in life. It was only religion that was able to arouse in people that splendid idealism, such as war could arouse.

Ask the Sphinx

The lecturer told of a man who when asked what questions he would ask the Sphinx if he was sure he could get an answer, said he would ask: "Is the world friendly?" It seems to be so hostile. If God is live, why all these tears? Other questions were: "Has the church collapsed? Has civilization collapsed?" He quoted a number of well known writers who gave it as their opinion that the world was on the road to destruction. War had given a new world, the question was whether it was better or worse. Before the war, power and pleasure were supreme. With the war came an exaltation of spirit. With generosity and splendid service men fought for a dream. Had their ideals been realized? He thought not. Politicians had not learned the lesson.

Speaking of the action of France in Germany today, Mr. Heustis suggested that France was trying to gratify her spirit of revenge and avarice at the same time. The situation would never be any better as long as the politicians had control. He told of the failure of the Washington conference, and also referred to the failure of President Wilson to put over his famous program at Versailles. There was nothing to be expected from the old men but he looked to the youth of today to take part in the settlement of the world problems. There was today a false philosophy of life. People were trying to get the circumference without the centre.

Two Methods

There were two ways of settling the problems. One was the Bolshevik method by which all ills were to be remedied at once and the other was the evolutionary method by which a better condition was brought about through a change in the hearts of men. Better things would come only on a religious basis. More education was needed. There must be an unveiling of truth "and the job of doing it is ours," declared the speaker. None could get away from their responsibilities. There was too much attention given to mental education and not enough

to moral. Why, he asked, was there so much difficulty in getting the Bible into the public schools? He made a plea for a new Bible, the Bible of the race, which would include all religions. They should teach more grammar in the schools. They were emphasizing too much the idea of getting on and were not realizing that money was the instrument of service. Betterment could be brought about only by a slow movement emanating from the hearts of men.
