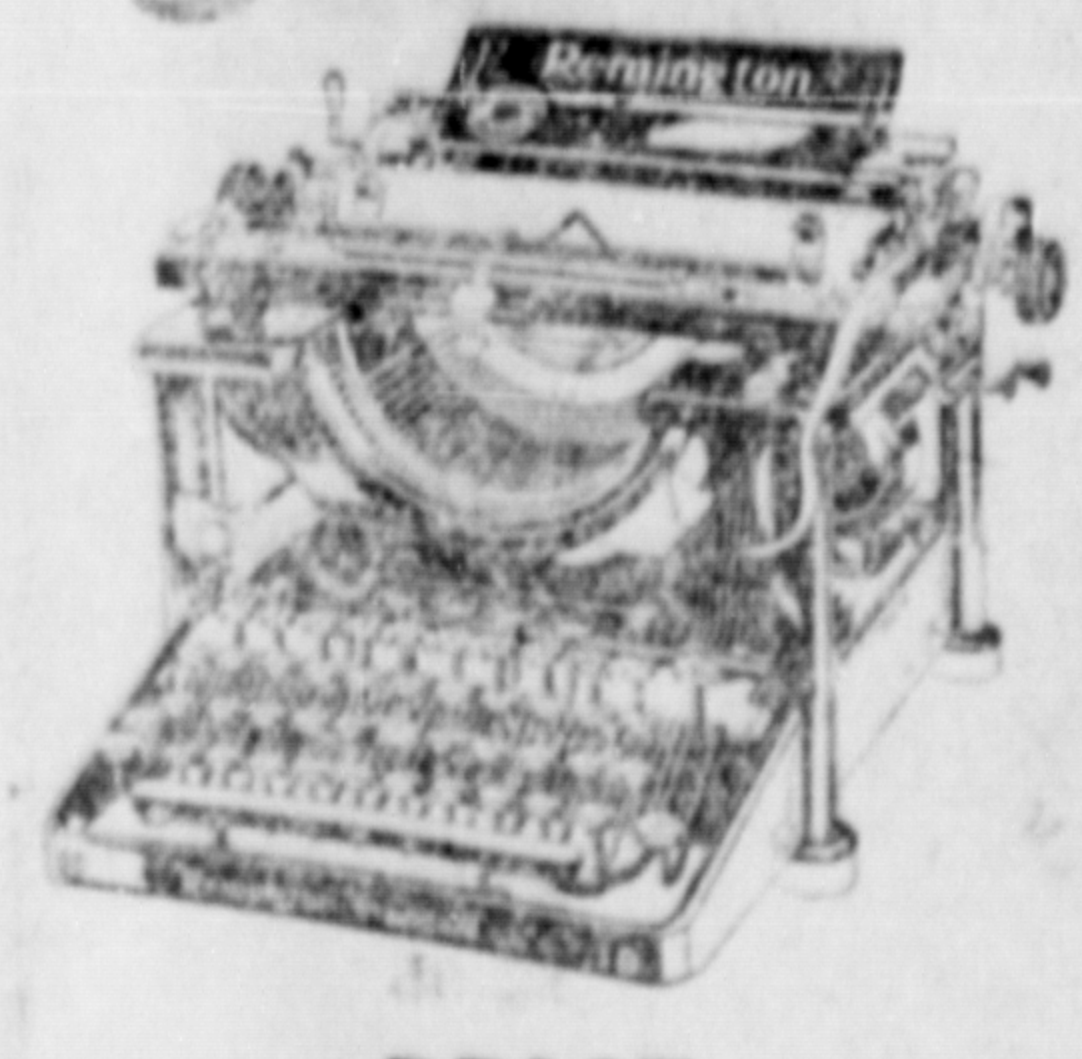

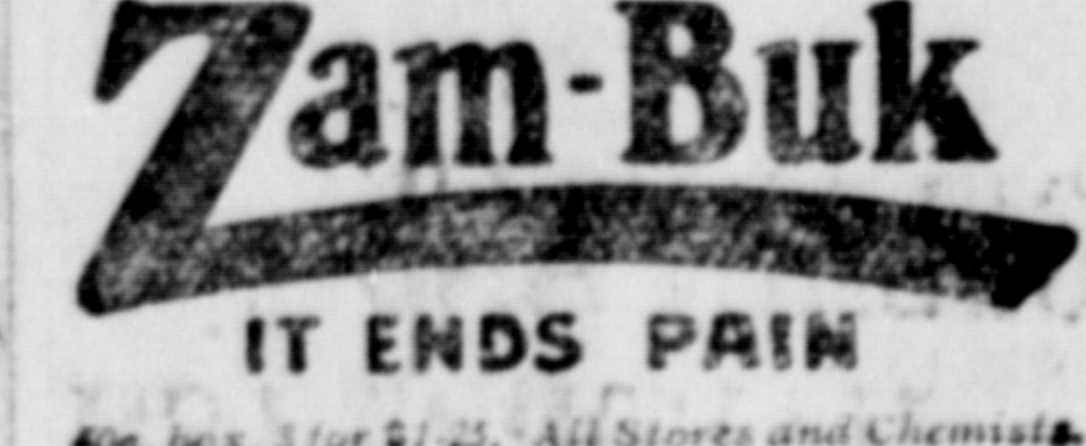

DECREASE OF BIRTH RATE

High Living Costs and Independence of Women in France is Cause

PARIS, Jan. 17.—The high cost of living, lack of apartments and homes for newly-married couples, selfishness, too many women employed in industry, and too much pleasure, are the general causes assigned for the alarming decrease of the birth rate in France, now the lowest in Europe.

This situation is set forth at length by the National Alliance for Increasing French Population. In comparison with a hundred years ago, each French marriage brings less than two children, instead of four children, whereas England's marriages bring nearly three children instead of nearly five a hundred years ago. In Germany in 1841, the average marriage brought 4.44 children as compared to 2.2 in 1921.

The birth decrease does not result from high mortality, or relatively fewer marriages. France's population of 39,000,000 in 1922 is practically that of 1900. The number of marriages for that year was 299,000, or about the average since then, with the years following the war showing a larger number, which is now returning to the average. For 1921 the number of marriages was 250,000, and for 1922 it was a little higher.

Until 1914, the number of births averaged 800,000 yearly. During several of the war years the number dropped to fewer than 400,000. The first six months of this year showed 386,726, as compared to 421,180 for the first six months of 1921.

It is argued that if France is to hold her place in the world and send emigrants to her colonies, she must pass laws, as already proposed in parliament, to give the voting majority to married men, reduce family taxes, and give bonuses for each child born. Already, families enjoy lower railway fares.

RETURNED SOLDIERS' INSURANCE EXPIRY DATE

An amendment to the Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act provides that insurance may not be granted on the lives of returned soldiers with or without dependents, in a serious condition of health from causes other than war service, or those without dependents, even when impairment is due to service. The amendment, however, contains the following proviso:

"Provided that applicants with or without pensionable disability who are so seriously ill that they have no expectancy of life, and who have dependents who are entitled to become beneficiaries under the contract as provided under the Act, shall be insurable under the Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act, up to, and inclusive of 1st JANUARY, 1923."

Insurance may be granted in all cases where the impairment is due to service and the returned soldier has dependents.

Application may be made at any local office of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, or by mail to Soldiers' Insurance Division, Daily Building, Ottawa.

Applications not affected by the above will be accepted until September 1st, 1923.
