TRAVELLING MAGISTRATES

These with Continuous Criminal
Assize Court Recommended
at Winnipeg

WINNIPEG, Jan. 17.—Appoint-
ment of travelling magistrates
in each of the judicial districts,
elimination of the grand jury
system and substitution of a
permanent criminal assize court
to sit the year round are some of
the changes recommended by
provincial police officers, to cut
down expenses in the adminis-
tration of justice and to speed
up trials, it was learned from a
senior official source today.

Abolition of the grand jury
system and substitution of a
permanent assize court are re-
form measures that have been
engaging the attention of police
officials and the attorney-general's
department for some time. The
appointment of travelling
magistrates, with more or less
extended jurisdiction, is some-
thing new. This move has been
suggested with a view to reduc-
ing the number of cases sent up
for trial. Many police magis-
trates throughout the province
have not the jurisdiction to con-
duct a summary trial, but must
commit the accused to stand
trial at the next court of com-
petent jurisdiction. Appoint-
ment of these travelling magis-
trates in each judicial district,
similar to the county judges,
would remove the necessity of
committing these persons for trial.

At present the procedure is
that following his committal for
trial a prisoner may be taken
before a county court judge and
then may elect for a speedy or
jury trial. It is suggested that
these magistrates should pur-
sue an itinerary similar to that
followed by county court judges.
There are six judicial districts
in the province: eastern, central,
southern, northern, western and
Dauphin.

Appointment of these travel-
ling magistrates would lessen
the work of the assize consider-
ably and in the event of the regu-
lar sittings of the assize court
probably would necessitate a
sitting of two or three weeks
every two months.

SWEDISH BUDGET A VERY LARGE ONE

Sum of \$24,000,000 Derived
From Liquor and Half Sum
Tobacco

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 17.—Sweden
expects an income of \$147,-
000,000 during the budget year
1923-24 of which 79 per cent.
will consist of taxes, according
to the report just published by
the Exchequer. The economic
depression is now past it is be-
lieved here and a general finan-
cial improvement is accepted as
an actual fact by the govern-
ment statisticians in calculating
the national revenue a year and
half in advance.

Among the items which appear
on the bill of income for the
next budget year is one of 76,-
000,000 kronor, or about \$20,-
000,000 which will come from
profits of the state's industries
or utilities. These include the
postal service, the state tele-
graphs, the state railways, the
state canals, the state power
stations, the state mines, the
tobacco monopoly, and the
state lands and real estate. The
taxes on the manufacture, sale
and distribution of the liquor
and malt will bring about \$24,-
000,000 into the national treas-
ury, and the taxes on tobacco
will yield about half that sum.

WINNIPEG PROPOSES JUBILEE AUDITORIUM

Commemoration of Fiftieth An-
niversary by Erection of
Large Civic Centre is
Discussed

WINNIPEG, Jan. 17.—Aldermen, both from the citizen ranks
of council and from the labor
group, are rallying to support
the proposition to erect a jubilee
auditorium in commemoration of
the city's fiftieth anniversary.
Though the consensus of opinion
at the city hall is that the
scheme should be financed by
the citizens at large or city or-
ganizations rather than by the
city itself.

Construction of the proposed
auditorium was the main topic
of discussion at the city hall to-
day. Several aldermen stated it
was one of the most urgent
needs. The cry for economy may
prove a bar to building of the
auditorium as a civic enterprise
but it is likely the scheme will
be initiated in council.
