EXILE OF PRINCESS PROVED BAD OMEN

Lady Who Was Banished For Introducing Flapper Ideas Among Indians, Returns

HATFIELD, Wis., Jan. 11.—(By Canadian Press.)—Princess Nowana Gayfish, who introduced bobbed hair and rolled hose, tan powder and slang into the settlement of the Winnebago Indians and was exiled from the settlement for it, has returned and will be allowed to remain. Further, more there will be no more protest against her "flapper" garb and habits.

Following her exile several weeks ago the reservation was visited by an epidemic of grip and a hoot owl, the Indians "ungulu" or "bad omen" visited the encampment nightly for weeks. Superstition got the better of Chief Running Wolf and he despatched the husband of the Princess after her with orders to bring her back regardless of whether she "reformed" or not. She returned and sat with her eighteen-month-old papoose strapped to her back while the hills resounded to the muffled booming of drums, the weird yelling of the braves and the wails of the frenzied squaws which accompanied the celebration of the "east of Owatunka" spirit of welcome.

DRYS WILL CONTROL AMERICAN CONGRESS

No Chance of Getting Any Change in United States Laws Regarding Liquor

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—(By Canadian Press.)—Notwithstanding the reports and rumors after the November 7 elections that the wets in the new Congress would force modifications of the Volstead prohibition law, the latest developments indicate that the drays are likely to take the whip hand more completely than ever. The new Congress comes into power March 4. It is conceded the new Senate will be more dry than the present one.

In the present House, Mr. Gillett of Massachusetts, the speaker, is a wet. The republican leader, Mr. Mondell of Wyoming, is a dry. The most prominent candidate for the place of Mr. Mondell is Representative Longworth of Ohio, son-in-law of former President Roosevelt. Mr. Longworth is a wet.

Now the drays are rising up to say that it will never do to re-elect Speaker Gillett and elect Representative Longworth leader. A number of men, including some of the farm bloc, are talking of an entire "new deal." They purpose to make Representative Temple of Pennsylvania speaker and Representative Graham of Illinois leader. Both are drays. This movement has not yet been fully tested but there are many things in the situation which are likely to make it formidable. Those who are engineering it are insistent that the House Republicans have got to organize away from the Old Guard elements as far as possible and that at the same time they must do nothing to stamp themselves as either wet or inclined to liberalize the Volstead Act. Inasmuch as most of the demerals in the House are dry, it is not difficult to see the wets are clinging to frail supports in any expectation they may have or assume to have of getting the prohibition laws made less strict.
