ARCHBISHOP DEMONSTRATES

Shows How His Little Improved
Pendulum Works With
Startling Results

Archbishop Du Vernet yesterday demonstrated to a Daily News representative the little Chevreul pendulum and its uses, especially in its relation to the experiments he has been making with it here, experiments which will attract the attention of the world.

The instrument is so simple that anyone can make it in less than two minutes. It is a short stick, possibly about twelve inches long, at the end of which is attached a string. At the other end of the string is suspended a weight, in this case a common latchkey. Holding this stick as an angler would hold a fishing rod, but with the elbow clear of the side, the improvised pendulum can be swung north and south or east and west by the simple experiment of thinking hard. The backward and forward movement can also be changed at will to a circular motion.

That is the old pendulum, the way in which it has been used for over one hundred years.

The Experiment

Then comes the Archbishop's experiment. He holds the stick in his hand as before and keeps his mind passive. The person with him concentrates on north and south and the pendulum begins to swing in that direction. He changes his thought to east and west and the change is made. He thinks circular motion and the little key rotates at his will. That is the basis of the experiments, which have been elaborated and used in spelling out letters with the pendulum swinging toward them, first one, then another until the word is spelled. The whole thing is simple and anyone can try it. The one thing necessary is concentration, with one mind passive and the other extremely active. The person holding the instrument does not know what the other is thinking but his muscles act, apparently, in obedience to the will of the person whose mind is active.
