BOSTON MINISTER BAPTIZED A DOG

Incurred Displeasure of Some of Congregation But Cannot Be Ousted

BOSTON, Jan. 18.—The Rev. Edwin Curtis, who incurred the displeasure of the Boston Presbytery when he baptized a dog and invoked divine blessing on French-fried potatoes, holds the pastorate of the First Presbyterian Church of Brookline under sanction of the law, the Supreme Court ruled in a recent decision by the full bench.

The court dismissed a bill of equity brought by a majority of the church society which sought to restrain use of the church property because Mr. Curtis did not have the approval of the Presbytery. It was ruled that the great majority of the members of the church favored Mr. Curtis' retention and so there was no controversy recognizable by the court.
