BURGLARY PREVENTED

Attempt Made Last Night to Enter McArthur's Shoe Store and Chinaman is Arrested

A phone call turned in to the police station at 11 o'clock last evening by Ben Crosssett and quick action by Sergeant A. H. Bailey foiled an attempted burglary of McArthur's shoe store and Me Chong alias Yung Chong, a Chinaman alleged to have a criminal record, appeared in the police court this morning before Magistrate McClymont on a charge of breaking and entering. Adjudgment was made until Monday.

Mr. Crosssett, who happened to be passing in the lane to the rear of the shoe store, notified the police that somebody was trying to break in. Sergeant Bailey went immediately to the scene and flashed the light on the back door of the store. A man stooped down as if trying to hide. Further investigation showed that an attempt had been made to enter the store by breaking the window of the rear door with an axe which had been dropped. The Chinese giving the name of Me Chong was handcuffed and taken to the station where he was locked up.

Returning to the store, Sergeant Bailey found that entrance had been partly made. The window glass had been broken and the bolt of the door had been withdrawn. The key in the door lock, however, had not yet been opened. Mr. McArthur had left the store only 40 minutes earlier.

Police records indicate that Me Chong under another name had been in the hands of the police before. He served terms of three years and two years for shop breaking and having stolen goods in his possession at Vancouver. He had also been in the local police court previously on drug charges. McArthur's shoe store was burglarized once before by a Chinaman said to have been a friend of accused. The man got two years.

On behalf of the finance committee, D. C. McEae, chairman, reported to the hospital board last night that September had been a poor hospital month. There had been only 1,000 days chargeable against patients and the earnings were correspondingly low.

Union steamer Gardena, Capt. A. E. Dickson, is making her regular voyage north this week in spite of the longshoremen's strike at Vancouver and should reach here about 4 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, according to word received by Jack Barnsley, local agent, this afternoon.

The hospital board decided last night that it was not necessary to give chemistry and dietetic instruction this year to the nurses training class as most of them took the training last year and there would be only one pupil. Next year there will be a large class. Practically all the pupil nurses at the hospital now with the exception of the probationers have taken that part of their training.

In view of the fact that Mrs. Donaldson had carried out the duties of matron during the interim before the arrival of Miss McGill and had done it very satisfactorily and had acted throughout in a most ladylike manner and had aided the new matron on her arrival and that during that time she had been paid less than regular matron's salary, the hospital board last night decided to set aside a special honorarium of \$25 for her. This will show the board's appreciation of her work.

At the hospital meeting last night several resolutions were endorsed and will be forwarded with that endorsement to the meeting of the B.C. Hospitals Association. One of these provided for the elimination of the liquor profits donation and the substitution thereof of a straight fifty cents per capita. Another was that the workmen's compensation grant should be increased to \$3 a day. A proposal that no new hospital should be instituted without proper investigation was eliminated as it was pointed out that there was already considerable investigation.
