Native Brotherhood of Northern B. C. Has Annual Sessions at Port Simpson

PORT SIMPSON, Nov. 30.—The second annual convention of the Northern British Columbia branch of the Native Brotherhood of British Columbia was in progress in the Church Hall here for three days last week. Delegates were in attendance from all the surrounding villages and many important matters were discussed, especially the proposal to have a residential school for the district established in Prince Rupert.

Many resolutions regarding the industrial life of the natives are also being sent to the proper authorities as a result of the convention. Everything touching upon the welfare of the natives was dealt with. A number of important resolutions regarding fishing were passed and are being forwarded to the fishery authorities.
