OTTAWA, June 15. — On an item of \$190,000 for the government of the Yukon territory, George Black in the House of Commons asked Hon. Charles Stewart to increase the territorial council by one member, making four, and also to increase their indemnities.

Mr. Stewart said that at present he could not recommend these changes.

LOWER DUTIES ARE LIKELY AUSTRALIA AGAINST CANADA

TORONTO, June 15. — Information has been received by the Bank of Commerce information department that the Australian parliament may be expected at its coming session to pass preferential legislation favoring a low tariff against Canada on goods which cannot be manufactured in Australia, notably newsprint.

CIVIL CASES ARE NOW IN PROGRESS AT ASSIZE COURT

Decrees Given in Two Divorce
Suits; Another to Come
Yet

Criminal cases now being all disposed of at the Supreme Court Assizes, proceedings in connection with civil cases are now under way before Mr. Justice Morrison.

The first case this morning was that of the Prince Rupert Brick & Tile Co. vs. F. G. De Mussy estate in which judgment was given the plaintiff represented by M. Gonzales.

Absolute decrees of divorce were granted James W. Fca against Eva Victoria Fca, J. P. Milne co-respondent, and Kate Ledak against Paul Ledak. M. Gonzales appeared for the first appellant and W. E. Fisher for the second. The Maud Sarah Kingston vs. Alvin S. Kingston, Elsie Gaum co-respondent, divorce case has been placed at the foot of the list. The appellant is not in the city and it may be necessary to traverse the action until next assizes. W. E. Fisher appears for the appellant.

A start was made this morning on the A. C. Sideras vs. B. McRae civil case of Smithers and adjournment was made until 2:30 this afternoon. The action is for the recovery of \$1,000 money lent. L. S. McGill appears for the plaintiff and H. L. Robinson for the defendant.

The J. Bruce Johnstone vs. Lakelse Hot Springs Ltd. case is being settled out of court.

YEAR IN JAIL AT END OF FIVE HUNDRED MILE TRIP FROM FAR NORTH

EDMONTON, June 15. — At Fitzgerald — Alberta's most northerly settlement — one W. H. McElhinney having figured out the law of supply and demand determined to enter business as a producer of illicit liquor, but in his calculations he forgot to include the R.C.M.P. and as a consequence he arrived in this city in charge of Constable W. J. Garland of the Fitzgerald detachment.

Like the "honey man" of childhood's days, the R.C.M.P. have a habit of "gettin' you if you ain't good" and Mr. McElhinney's still was proved to be no exception to this theory. The story of his trailing, capture and appearance before the local magistrates was short, sweet and to the point. J. Hursell and Inspector Fletcher, R.C.M.P., occupied the magistrial bench and the would-be merchant was fined \$500 without costs, also imprisonment for six months. The fine not being forthcoming the brewer will occupy a cell in Fort Saskatchewan jail for a year.

Constable Garland brought his prisoner south via the river steamer from Fitzgerald to Waterways and thence by the A. & G. W. train to the city.
