Duncan McRae and Thomas McMeekin called in the News Office this morning with some wonderful samples of fruit grown in their respective gardens. One was a branch of gooseberries and the other red currants. Both fruits would be worthy of decking the first prize stall at any horticultural exhibition ever staged anywhere. The results of painstaking gardening were thereby exemplified knocking the muskeg myth on the head for all time. The samples will be hung in the windows of McRae Bros., Third Avenue store and budding gardeners could not do better than interview the prize fruit growers on how it was done.

During the stay of the steamer in port the visitors were taken around the harbor on a visit to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company's plant and a general sightseeing trip in the launches Triton, Narbeth, Oh Baby, and Dixie Rupert, accompanied by R. 
