Sing Anthem And Revere The Flag.

Speaking recently at Washington President Harding urged that every citizen of the United States should learn to sing the national anthem, be taught to revere the flag and to maintain unimpaired the things for which the flag stands.

Possibly this might be a lesson for us. Most of us can sing the British national anthem but few know the Canadian anthem and sections of the people throughout the country each sing a different version. Possibly the best version has not yet been written but it is a pity all cannot agree on some verses now in use. The Canadian Club has made laudable efforts with this end in view but not yet with marked success. To sing the anthem and revere the flag is a great impetus toward unity of purpose. Even those who believe in the greater internationalism of the future, as most people today do, can still be loyal to their own country.

Stand At Attention In Singing Anthem.

The American people are advised from time to time as to how they shall honor the flag of their country and as to their duties toward the state. Possibly here we do too little of that sort of thing. We are apt to look with a certain amount of contempt on those who make outward displays of their loyalty.

Those who have noticed the War Veterans or a regiment of soldiers stand at attention when singing the national anthem have been struck with the effect. The moment the first strains of the music are heard, the men straighten up and their hands come to their sides. It is a treat to watch them. The comparison with the person who slouches to his feet and leans against a post while the anthem is being sung is most noticeable.

We owe it to the symbol of our nation to pay respect to the flag and to the song which should be the crystallizing of our national spirit. The person who honors his country is the real internationalist, for he can never be loyal to a world state unless he first learns to be loyal to his family, his province, and his country. If we are to be a great people we must learn to be a unit on great things and the flag and the anthem are the symbols of those.

Those Who Leave During Singing.

There are a few Marxian socialists who refuse to sing a national anthem and who may always be seen making for the door the moment the anthem is commenced. Nothing but pity can be felt for those whose mental outlook is so restricted that they cannot see that even in a socialist community there would have to be loyalty in order to insure success. The man who is not loyal to his country will not be loyal to the great cause of the workers or to any other cause.

People are gregarious. They live in communities. As long as they do this there must be a binding force, else there can be no unity of purpose and no hope of success in anything that is undertaken.

Union Of Forces May Come Into Effect.

Some day there may be unity of forces which make for advancement. It is not at all improbable that the English speaking world may unite for a common purpose, not temporarily but permanently. If ever there is to be a world state, it will have to come, not through disintegration of present national boundaries but in the extension of those boundaries. Germans had a dream of a world state which should be Germany and the ideal would have been all right if it had not been selfish. So, many have a dream of Anglo Saxon dominance. Neither of these can succeed. There must be no dominance. It is because of the absence of the note of dominance that the British people have been able to hold together and to hold other nations with them. Possibly as time goes on the English speaking nations may become the core of a world state of which all other nations will become a part. If so there will have to be a lot of unselfish work done and a great deal of breaking down, not so much of national barriers, but of fiscal and racial barriers.

TRIFLING WOMEN IS STORY OF ZAREDA THE CRYSTAL GAZER

The new Rex Ingram film,
Trifling Women, which is to be
here Wednesday combines the
elements of excellence that have
stamped him as one of the hope-
fuls of the screen. It has the
dramatic thrill of "The Four
Horsemen"; the romantic beauty
of "The Prisoner of Zenda," and
the suspense of "The Conquering
Power." It has, too, what each
of these photoplays had; remark-
able attention to details, supreme
good taste and intelligence, and
an uncanny gift for pungent
characterization.

"Trifling Women" is a story
within a story. In order to point
a moral to his pleasure-loving
and frivolous daughter, who ig-

nores a devoted lover, her au-
thor-father reads to her the
manuscript of his new novel, the
story of Zareda, the crystal gazer.
He recounts the woman's terrific
fascination, which leads brother
to conspire against brother, and
father against son. He tells how
Zareda's hold on an old Baron,
whose son Ivan, too, shares her
favors; of the young man's de-
parture to war; of the Baron's
death at Zareda's instigation; of
Ivan's return and his discovery
that she has married a wealthy
Marquis for his money; and,
finally, of the illicit love of Ivan
and Zareda, costing them their
lives in the Sorcerer's Tower.

PRISONER OF ZENDA FEATURE OF THE WEEK

Well Known Story Shown in Pic-
ture This Week End
Here

The "Prisoner of Zenda" is the
week-end picture here. It is a
story teeming with dramatic ac-
tion, full of intrigue, romance
and excitement. It concerns the
adventures of an English gentle-
man, one Rudolf Rassendyll,
who, because of a remarkable
likeness to the ruler of the myth-
ical kingdom of Ruritania, be-
comes for a time its actual ruler
and wins the love of the Princess
Flavia.

The Prisoner of Zenda is the
most popular romance of a
generation. From the time when
Anthony Hope, then more in-
terested in his political career in
England than in writing, com-
posed it, the narrative of Rudolf
Rassendyll's reckless adventure
has taken hold of the hearts of
all who read. This was the first
of the stories of romance in
little kingdoms in Europe, and no
better indication can be had of
its success than that it inspired
hundreds of writers to imitate it.
But none of the resulting stories
had the zest, the devil-may-care
spirit of the original, for that
was written chiefly for the love
of imagination the author had; it
was as glamorous to him as to
his readers.

The Prisoner of Zenda has
stepped out of the pages of the
book and come very much to life
on the screen. Different essen-
tially from "The Four Horse-
men," as different as realism is
from romance, the newer pic-
ture nevertheless has been done
upon the same great scale and
with the same faithfulness to
the spirit of the written page.
