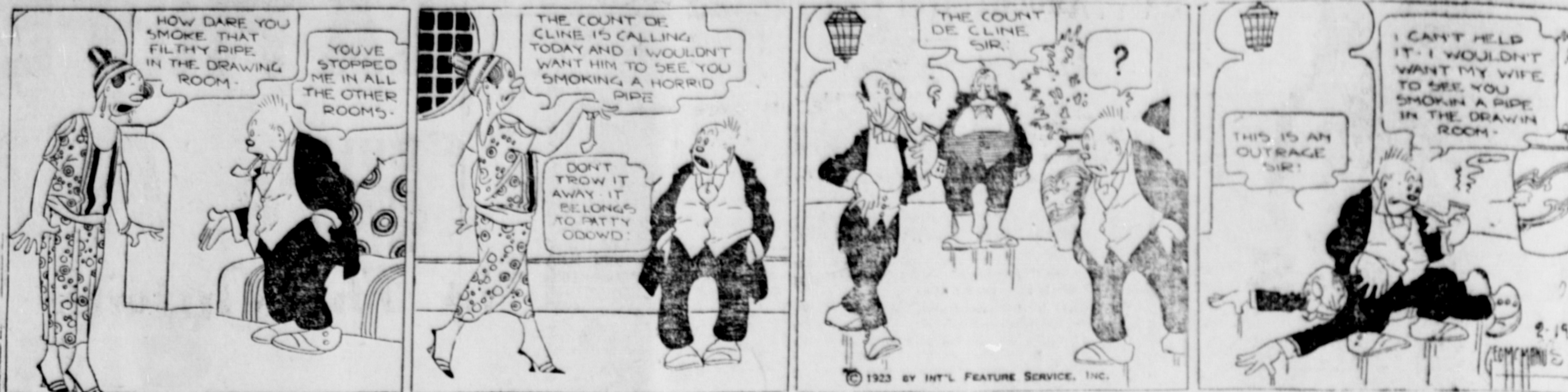

A meeting between Alex. Roy, the local lightweight boxer, and Joe Manilla, the Ketchikan star, is now on tap and may be pulled off some time this summer. Negotiations are also under way for both Roy and Manilla to meet Harry Blanton, of Stewart. first of this month, there will be five tournaments at Hurlingham, Ranelagh and Southampton clubs.

Judge Kenesaw M. Landis, director of organized baseball in the United States, sees in the unprecedented crowds at the New York American's new park and the New York National League Polo Grounds this season a grave and alarming danger to baseball, the possibility of top-heavy league races, due to the increased financial strength of the Yankees and Giants. "The danger of the situation may be merely theoretical," the judge says, "but advance fears are seemingly justified when one city is capable of sending 75,000 fans to a ball game while another is restricted by structural and population limitations to crowds of 25,000." The judge said he had no suggestion to offer designed to meet the situation, but listened attentively to a description of a plan in vogue in the southern league by which cities of a smaller population are enabled to compete on even terms with larger cities in the buying and assembling of players, compared with the possibility of the two New York clubs, with great wealth obtainable through enormous attendance, outbidding any rival club in either league for the services of star players.
