NEW YORK, May 17.—Carrying with him many specimens of living cell tissue artificially propagated by Dr. Alexis Carrel in his experiments at the Rockefeller Institute, Dr. P. Lecomte De Nony, his assistant, has left for France where he will represent the Rockefeller Institute at the Pasteur Centenary at Strasbourg.

Dr. Carrel ministered to the living cells every day for eleven years except for the period when he was in the French army when Dr. De Nony attended them.
