OTTAWA PAPER TALKS LIQUOR

Backs up Hon. A. M. Manson in Statement That Conservatives in Senate Caused Murder

The Ottawa Citizen, independent, discusses the liquor question as it affects British Columbia and the conduct of those associated with it. The paper says: Without being accused, William Garland McQuarrie, Conservative member of New Westminster, has denied, so far as he is concerned, having received any money from liquor interests to influence legislation. The private liquor warehousing concerns in British Columbia are believed to have made a profit of well over a million dollars last year. Naturally, they are opposed to the federal government's measure which would allow the provincial government to suppress them. The opinion has been expressed that the liquor interests will use money in an extremely liberal fashion to prevent the passing of House of Commons Bill No. 43, which is intended to close the private importing and exporting warehouses.

There are other methods of using money to influence legislation than by bribing elected representatives, or public men. No one would believe for a moment that members of parliament could be so bribed. There are such things as party funds, however, and the Conservative minister of justice in the last parliament, R. B. Bennett, is authority for the statement, on the floor of the house, that legislation has been influenced through contributions to party funds.

Main Question
The question before the federal parliament at the present time is whether British Columbia is to be allowed to suppress the sources of supply to law-breaking liquor agencies within that province. Unless some adequate reason can be given for denying to British Columbia the right to suppress private importation, to the dry provinces last session, also the Conservative opposition to close the private liquor warehouses, Conservative members will properly be regarded by the public as merely playing party politics with the liquor interests behind them.

The attorney general of British Columbia, A. M. Manson, has effectively answered H. H. Stevens' criticism. The liquor exporting warehouses are operating in British Columbia entirely because Conservative senators last session defeated the legislation to close them. The responsibility is upon the Conservatives for the lawlessness due to the liquor exporting business, so long as they continue to protect the liquor firms by party politics at Ottawa.

Illicit Trade
It is admitted by Conservative members that the warehousing concerns are sources of supply for illicit liquor trade. Mr. Stevens is reported as saying in the House last Wednesday that "everybody in British Columbia knows that the exporting business carried on from these houses was bootlegging business deliberately violating the laws of the United States and deliberately contravening the laws of Alberta." A few weeks ago, the same Conservative member for Vancouver Center exhorted the churches in Ottawa to get into the fight against the activities of disruptive agencies who are operating to undermine law and order in this country.

But where does Mr. Stevens stand when British Columbia is asking for legislation to suppress the houses that thrive on law-breaking? And what else but party politics could have inspired Mr. Stevens to make the statement that the "wretches who were hanged" at Fort Saskatchewan—for the murder of the provincial police officer who tried to arrest a rum-runner—"committed their heinous crime in the carrying out of that business in the Grow's Nest Pass based upon the consent of the attorney general to establish the business in that section."

The liquor exporting warehouses were established in the locality named by Mr. Stevens long before the present attorney general for British Columbia came into office. He sought legislation in Ottawa last session to put an end to the exporting houses. Conservative senators defeated the legislation. Clearly the responsibility is upon the

Party Politics
Another Conservative member's move to delay action still further, by saying that a referendum should be taken on the question of closing the warehouses in British Columbia, cannot be regarded as anything but party politics. The people of British Columbia voted for "government control," which they understood to mean that the liquor profiteering business would be taken out of private hands. "Government control" is not much of an improvement from the temperance point of view, but it is what the people voted for.

The attorney general says, "Government control and private importation are contemporaneously impossible. Private importation is nine-tenths for bootlegging." Conservatives in the House of Commons held the same view as the British Columbia government, as to the desirability of the legislation last session, to suppress private importation. The British Columbia legislature to the dry provinces last session, also the Conservative opposition expressed themselves as approving the principle of this legislation. The Conservative party in the province issued a pamphlet not long ago in which it outlined the Conservative policy if a Conservative government were elected to power, as follows:

Absolute Control
This new government will also use every effort with the Dominion government, under whose jurisdiction the matter lies, to see that legislation is passed at Ottawa which will stop the importation of liquor into this province by private parties, so that all liquor purchased and sold in British Columbia will be absolutely under government control. What influence has been brought to bear to change Conservative party tactics in the federal house, on the question of suppressing private liquor warehousing firms in British Columbia? This question is of interest to the people of Canada in other provinces. It should be especially interesting to Conservatives in Ontario, who are shortly to be asked to vote confidence in Howland Ferguson as a possible Conservative premier.

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AVERAGE PRICES PAID FOR FURS IN CANADA

Official Report Says Increase in Production Has Been Considerable

Furs constitute one of Canada's important resources and in the season of 1921-22 the value of furs marketed increased over the previous season by over 87,000,000. This information is given by the Dominion bureau of statistics in a statement issued from which also the following facts are taken:

"The local value of pelts of fur-bearing animals taken in Canada during the season of 1921-22 was \$47,377,834, an increase over the previous season of 87,266,240, or 71 per cent. The value of pelts of all kinds was \$345,316, an increase of 47 per cent over 1920-21. These figures comprise pelts of animals taken by trappers and pelts of ranch bred animals. Muskrat pelts increased by over one million in number and by over two million dollars in value. Beaver pelts increased from 164,656 valued at \$2,686,472 in 1920-21 to 234,645, valued at \$4,258,579 in 1921-22. According to value the principal kind of pelts in 1921-22 were: Muskrat, \$4,687,818; beaver, \$4,258,579; mink, \$1,839,785; marten, \$1,212,603; silver fox, \$732,674; white fox, \$1,619,337; red fox, \$472,847; fisher, \$424,063; otter, \$372,694; skunk \$344,044."

Average Prices Higher
The average prices paid for pelts in the season 1921-22 were greater than those in the previous season. For example the average price of beaver was \$18.38 as against \$16.31; white

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fox, \$39.70, as against \$34.62;	
muskrat, \$1.53, as against \$1.24;	
otter, \$27.26, as against \$24.42;	
fisher, \$71.65, as against \$58.86;	
skunk, \$2.31, as against \$1.73;	
raccoon, \$3.68, as against \$3.05;	
wolverine, \$17.56, as against \$13.90. One of the few decreases was silver fox, which brought \$147.36, as against \$151.99 the previous year.
