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**Lay Plans Now For Week At Fair.**  
This is a good time to lay plans for the forthcoming fair week. Of course everyone will wish to be present for the big event and it is stated that something will be doing at the fair each afternoon and evening that will make a visit there worth while.

The fair is our one big bet each year. We pride ourselves on it and doubtless the people here will not fail on this occasion.

**Entertain Visitors Who Come To City.**  
A number of visitors will be here from different parts of the district and some of them will have to remain in the city for a longer time than they wish because of the boat service. While they are here Prince Rupert people who know them ever so slightly might well go out of their way to entertain them. On the manner in which they are treated here will depend the future attitude of many of them to this city. It is begging the question to say it is not done elsewhere. **Redistribution Difficult Matter.**  
Redistribution will be a difficult matter. It will be undertaken by the Legislature this autumn when the government brings in a bill changing the borders of some of the constituencies. It is to be hoped that in making that change the Prince Rupert constituency will be somewhat narrowed and that another member will be added to the northern representatives.

No one will wish to see the number of members increased and it is possible that the greatest change will be brought about by giving Peace River a representative and then re-arranging the boundaries of the others. Ocean Falls and Bella Coola may also be lopped off this district.

This seems to be the time to make any representations to the government in regard to the matter for everyone will have his own opinion of what is best to do and sometimes in the multitude of counsellors there is wisdom.

**English Objecting To American Caricatures.**  
American pictures taken at Hollywood of English scenes are said to be often most grotesque and when the films reach England, as they almost invariably do, they become a source of great amusement to the English people. Occasionally they are so bad that they rouse the ire of the people across the water.

The difficulty seems to be that often the scenes are put on by actors who have never visited England and who know absolutely nothing of the country and its habits. In many cases they have not even read English books. These people set out to portray English life as they imagine it and then try to sell the product to the people of England. It is no wonder that the people there sometimes call a halt.

**RUPERT MENTIONED COMMUNITY LEAGUE MEETING AT ANYOX**

George Willisroft to Manage Baseball Team to Play Here During Fair

ANYOX, Sept. 7.—The last regular meeting of the Community League council was held with President Callanan in the chair. The Secretary's report announced a successful dance on Labor Day, financially and otherwise; that Geo. Willisroft had been appointed by the baseball executive as manager of the team to play in the tournament at Prince Rupert during the fair, and that the gold medal won by Mrs. McIntosh, of Prince Rupert, for first in the Dressmaking Classes of the Northern British Columbia Polytechnic Institute, had been ordered. A request had also been received from the Ladies' Auxiliary to the Hospital Board asking for Recreation Hall for Halloween night, the object being a dance to provide funds for the annual hospital Xmas tree.

The Council set aside Recreation Hall for Halloween Night as requested by the Ladies' Auxiliary. It was then suggested that all bona fide organizations in existence twelve months or more should be granted the use of Recreation one night a year, rental free, for concert or dance purposes. This was passed by the council.

In connection with a request for information as to kindergartens, a letter was read from the Ontario Department of Education. This outlined necessary equipment, but did not touch the most important information wanted—costs of equipment and salaries paid teachers. The Secretary was authorized to get further information regarding costs of operation and teachers' salaries. There was some discussion on library matters, but as Mr. Jones, chairman of this committee, was not present, these matters were laid over until the next meeting of the council. After the council had passed, at the request of the chairman, a resolution of thanks to the ladies who had made the Labor Day dance such an outstanding success, the meeting adjourned.
