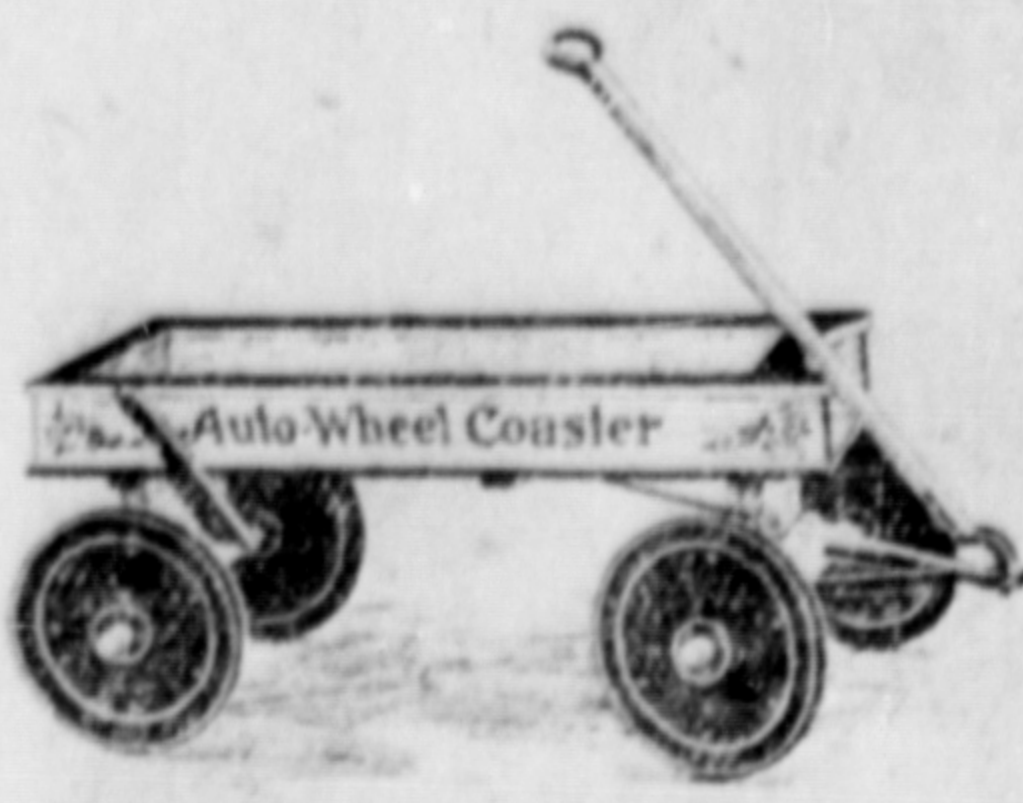

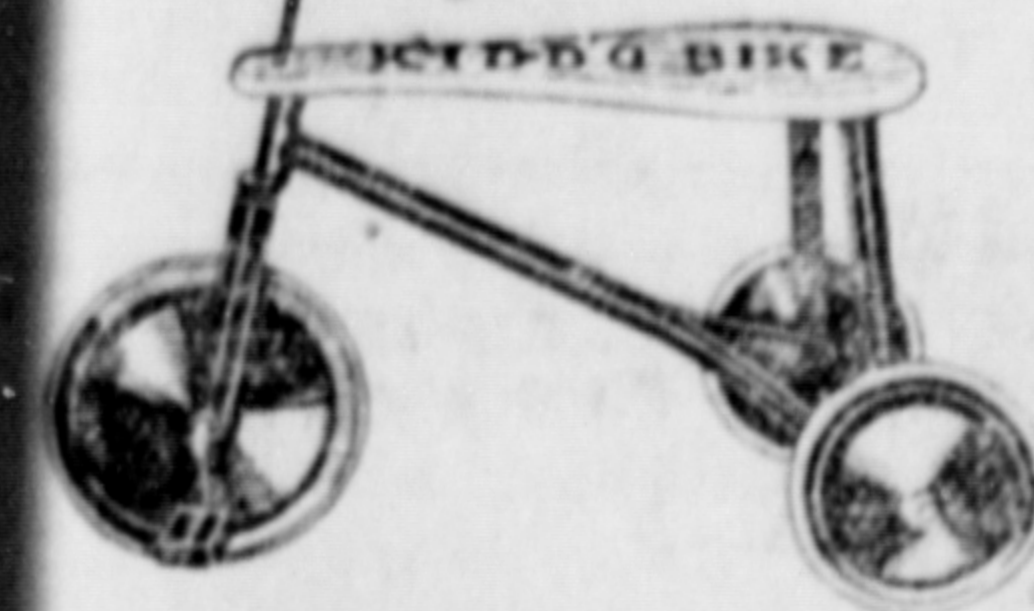

LITTLE BOY WAS RUN OVER BY BIG TRUCK

Tommy Smith Owes His Life to Presence of Mind of Canadian Express Co.'s Driver

Tommy Smith, 9-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Smith, is in the General Hospital as a result of an accident on Third Avenue near Third Street yesterday afternoon when he was run over by the Canadian National Express Co.'s delivery truck driven by George Derrington. Although both wheels of the heavy truck passed over the boy it is believed that his injuries are not very serious and that he will soon recover from the accident.

Apparently the lad had been riding on a pile of lumber being carried on a Pacific Cartage truck driven by Vic Menzies. Jumping suddenly from the truck, he stopped in front of the express motor, giving the driver no chance to stop although much presence of mind was exercised by Mr. Derrington in the way he handled the car when the lad was under it. To this the boy probably owes his life.

Young Smith was run over by a car a short time ago and at that time had his leg broken.
