

BRITISHERS ALL CAN GET WORK

So Says Superintendent of Immigration in Regard to Reports to Contrary

WINNIPEG, Aug. 28.—"I consider the reports that British harvest workers have been lured to Canada under false pretenses and left jobless, to be mischievous, misleading, inaccurate, and liable to do incalculable harm, as such stories will not be reproduced in Old Country papers and will be a black eye for Canada. They are liable to interfere seriously with the regular immigration to this country, and make it impossible to secure harvest workers from Great Britain should their services be required again."

This was the keynote of a statement made yesterday by Major L. F. Howard, superintendent of immigration for western Canada, in commenting on published reports that British harvesters are being left stranded and jobless in Alberta and Saskatchewan.

The same newspaper reports charged that the plans for bringing the harvesters had been made with the aid of the government. Respecting this phase of the matter, Major Howard said:

"I do not know who was responsible for the scheme to bring these workers to Canada; certain it is that the matter was not decided as alleged at a representative meeting in Winnipeg early this summer of representatives of the government, other transportation concerns and employment officials. While I am personally inclined to think the importation of these harvest workers was a good idea, I knew nothing about it until the first groups were on the way."

He says he never knew so many ducks as are to be seen on the lakes and on the open ground grouse are very plentiful. They are to be seen everywhere. Prince George, according to Mr. Watt, has been in the dry belt this year. There has been plenty of rain to the east and also to the west of that place but just there they have missed the rainstorms with the result that the place is rather dried out. Crops are good everywhere along the line and the hay is especially heavy. The Bulkley and Nechaco valleys have seldom looked as well as they do today.

USES JAPANESE TOBACCO

TOKIO, Aug. 27.—Japanese tobacco of inferior quality is being sent from Japan to Egypt in increasing quantities, blended there, brought back as "Egyptian" cigarettes and sold by the Japanese tobacco monopoly at high prices.

In 1922, according to the Japan Economist, approximately 1,168,000 bales of this tobacco were thus treated and the amount will be exceeded this year.
