BRACEBRIDGE, Ont., Aug. 20 .- Two persons are known to be dead and one is believed dead, while nine are missing. and two severely injured as the result of a fire which destroyed the Wawa Hotel at Lake of the Bays, Muskoka district, early Sunday morning. All records being burned makes it difficult definitely to check up exactly who was in the building. Some place the loss of life as high as twenty.

Prepared Immediately and the Building Erected

It is understood that plans are Canadian National Railways to be erected on the hill back of the house at present occupied by N. B. Walton or at some such suitable spot overlooking the water. It is understood the building. while nothing like what was at first planned, will be such as will be a credit to the city and will take care of the steadily increasing tourist business here.

A. A. Cox, architect, who left for the south Saturday night, refused to discuss the question, but he will be back very soon and it is understood he will then have the sketch plans with him. Befor leaving he completed the work of revising the plans for the Nurses' Home, for which J. Mc-Kechnie has the contract.

Owing to the popularity of the Prince Rupert route and to the steadily increasing business this way, it has been felt for some time that the company must have FISHERMEN'S HOME a hotel here to handle the busi. ness. Also it is felt that as Prince Rupert gave the company a ten year tax rebate conditional on the hotel being built, the company is now morally if not legally bound to erect it.
