BRINGING UP FATHER

TELLS ABOUT
PORT SIMPSONMany a Fierce Fight Took Place
There in Early Days Says
Edward Marsden

Writing for the Ketchikan News, Edward Marsden, of New Metlakatla told in a recent number about the early days of Port Simpson. He said:

"The excessive heat in my stateroom on the Admiral Rogers, on the way south, made me get up rather early one morning. When I stepped out on deck region of Port Simpson on our left on the shore of Northern British Columbia was in sight. I could not make out the town but the country about was in plain view. The knowledge of the Indian names of the hills, the islands, the creeks, the inlets, and even the reefs came back to me. Even the name Port Simpson gave way in my mind to the Indian name of Lach-tleoo 'kah-lahms.

Population 10,000

About 1833 Port Simpson was founded by the Hudson Bay traders after a stay of three years up the Naas River. Here the Tsimpshean Indians flocked together from their primitive homes and built up a large settlement of nearly 10,000 souls around the trading post. A Christian lady by the name of Mrs. Work, wife of the physician in the stockade, was the real beginner in the conversion of the Indians. Next came Captain Provost of the British Navy in 1855 who was so touched with the needs of the Indians that on his return to England he pleaded with the Church Missionary Society to send out here a missionary. That was how Father Duncan first came to Port Simpson in 1857.

Port Simpson of the days gone by, was the new home of our people. They did not know any better. They were so primitive and so childish that highly colored cloths, beads, sweet molasses and abundance of rum made them abandon their homes farther south and flock to Port Simpson. The traders encouraged this and they profited by it. Port Simpson became one of the great centres of gathering of valuable furs on the North Pacific coast. Just think of it—a handful of beads that cost a farthing or two to manufacture in England was turned into something like ten pounds sterling in furs at Port Simpson.

Had Slaves There

Many a fierce fight, tribe against tribe, took place at Port Simpson. It was the starting point of many an expedition to distant places. There were many slaves in Port Simpson and these were captured from distant tribes. As I am looking ashore I could not help but think that many volumes of books could be written on the history, the scenes, the exciting and amusing stories in and around this place. Here my parents were born and here they made up their minds to change their life.

COUNCIL MEMBERS
