A SATURDAY SERMON

Life Set Free From Care

(By Very Rev. J. B. Gibson, Dean of St. Andrew's Cathedral)

That part of the Sermon on the Mount which centres around the injunction "Be not anxious" seems strangely out of touch with our modern mind and temper. He who had no home, no business cares, no social responsibilities—what could He know of the problems and burdens of the man of today?

Yet even here Christ has a message for our time. By the place He gives to the causes and cures of worry He indicates it is something that is ever present with us irrespective of age or clime and that it is a real menace to human life. Our experience corroborates that view. The chief enemy of human happiness is worry. More characters are wrecked, careers ruined, homes blighted by this than by any other single cause. Not responsibility but anxiety saps vitality. Not work but worry kills.

The mere injunction "Be not anxious" would have been worthless if the Master had not shown us how to attain the serenity and peace of His own life. He calls us first to trust in the love of God. He who feeds the birds and clothes the lilies, shall He not much more feed and clothe us, even though we be of little faith? In the face of injustice and inequality we are to believe in this Divine Providence. The larger experience of humanity confirms its reality and bids us believe "God's in His heaven, All's right with the world." As some one has put it—when you trust you do not worry and when you worry you do not trust.

Christ calls us next to cultivate the higher powers of soul, putting first in thought and purpose the Kingdom of God. We shall find peace of mind when we turn from

outward appearance to the supreme things of the spirit. History proves at every turn that men and women who have their thoughts upon the supreme ideals and values have been able to rise above adversity and sorrow and to find peace. When we think of John G. Paton kneeling beside the grave of his wife in the New Hebrides and praying God to save that island to him, when we think of Wilfred Grenfell leaving his friends and home in order to bring the message of the Gospel to Labrador, when we see Francis of Assisi thanking God for his poverty, we understand that there is something that can lift us out of worry and feverish fear into a peace like our Master's.

And again Christ summons us to view our lives in the perspective of eternity. The real life of the soul lies beyond these fleeting years on earth in the love and serenity of the land to be. We have swung too far from other worldliness to an almost total neglect of the thought of the future life.

Listening then to the words of our Master we are set free from care and worry through confidence in God's love, through a life of idealism, through a living hope in a heaven above. These are the secrets through which we may share the serenity and calm of Him who promised us His peace.




