## WONDERFUL AIR WEAPON

Huge Airships Will Hover Among Clouds and Launch Smaller Craft

LONDON, July 14 .-- Keels are now being laid in Great Britain for huge rigid airships which will hover above the clouds with a number of small fighting machines on board ready to launch at a foe, says an aeronautical expert in the London Daily Chronicle. The task of these new machines of war, he says, will be to carry aloft to immense heights and to necessary, transport, thousands of miles, squadrons of swift, deadly, steelbuilt "attack-planes." These will be launched from high above the clouds, and will rush at 200 miles an hour and more earthward to harry other aircraft and raid the commerce of the seas.

"The airships will have the power, lacking in a small machine," the writer says, "of longdistance flights at a great altitude, while on the other hand, the small planes they carry will be able to outfly and out-fight any machine laden for a long journey.



## Prince Rupert Will Talk Direct with Victoria and Other Southern Points by Wireless says Haughton

VICTORIA, July 14 .- With the object of increasing the efficiency of the wireless service on the British Columbia coast, the Dominion government will this summer change the apparatus at the Gonzales Hill, Bull Harbor, Alert Bay and Prince Rupert stations from the spark to the continuous wave system, according to an announcement by E. J. Haughton, superintendent of radio-telegraphs for British Columbia.

This would mean increased range for all these stations and a general speeding up of the government wireless service on this coast, Mr Haughton stated.
