WATERFRONT WHIFFS

John Clausen Buys New Boat—Made Trip to San Diego—Doug Frizzell Takes Winter Dip

Seized for debt over a year ago and confiscated by order of the Exchequer Court of Canada, the Prince Rupert built fishing vessel Ada No. 11 was disposed of recently by the provincial government by open tender. The successful bidder was John Clausen, well known Prince Rupert fish packer, who acquired the vessel for \$3000.

Albert Frebourg, well known member of the staff of Edward Lipsett Ltd., returned to the city recently after a three weeks' holiday trip in the course of which he travelled as far south as San Diego, the trip being a most enjoyable one. From Vancouver to Los Angeles and back, Albert travelled by motorbus while the trip between Los Angeles and San Diego was made by airplane.

An incident of no little amusement took place last week at Captain's Cove where the crew of Frizzell's Hot Springs was demolishing the old cannery, the lumber to be used in construction of buildings at the springs. The crew, consisting of Doug Frizzell, Bill Fisher, Doug Stalker and Sherry Frizzell, was returning from its duties in a nine-foot skiff after a hard day's work. Fisher was in the bow, Sherry was at the oars, Stalker was sitting in the stern and Doug Frizzell was, as usual, standing up. Fisher, with his keen eyesight, noticed water pouring into the stern but sweetly said nothing. Stalker, perceiving an increasing wetness, made a few odd remarks which had no bearing on the case. Then Sherry, noticing the predicament he was about to be in and deeming discretion the better part of valor, jumped for a passing log. Confusion then reigned supreme as the boat capsized, scattering its three remaining occupants in all directions. Fisher made a jump for the log on which Sherry was perched like a dying sea-gull, rolling the latter into the water. Doug Stalker, who has acquired the chewing habit, swam to shore on his back to keep the plug of Old Stag in his pocket dry. Doug Frizzell, like the good skipper he is, being the last to leave the boat, had his annual New Year swim a little ahead of time—but chilly just the same. The Flewin & Brown fish packer Taplow II is on the ways at the McLean shipyard at Prince Rupert where she was built for hull repairs following a stranding in a snow-storm on the night of Wednesday when considerable damage was done. The vessel was running into Prince Rupert from Port Simpson when she ran on Hodgson Reef off Jap Point. The vessel refloated on the rising tide and was able to make Prince Rupert under her own power.

The Department of Marine advises mariners that a red platform buoy marking Hankin Reef, Cunningham Passage, near Port Simpson, has been replaced temporarily by a red wooden spar buoy.

After an absence from port of about a month, the well known local halibut boat Margaret I returned home on Thursday from a trip to Vancouver and Seattle. The trip south was made so that Capt. George Fritz, owner and skipper, might attend fishery gatherings as representative of the Prince Rupert Halibut Vessel Owners' Association.

The big Vancouver tug St. Faith, which is engaged in log towing from the Queen Charlotte Islands to the mainland, was in port this morning to take on fuel oil.


