Big Lumber Industry at Buckley Bay is Most Important of all and Operations are Increasing

(By H. F. Pullen) The big industry of Queen Charlotte Islands at the present time is the lumber mill at Buckley Bay which turns out about 175,000 feet of lumber a day in a shift and a quarter. This is Dr. without the aid of the new re-saw plant which is about ready for operation and which will considerably increase the output. The management is also considering putting on a double shift, when it is hoped to cut something like 400,000 feet a day. The payroli of the company averages about \$80,000 a month with about 450 men employed.

The Massett Timber Co., Ltd. that operates the mill, controls most of the timber on the Inle!. Only spruce and hemlock is being cut at present, the cedar, which comes out with the other timper, is stored awaiting a market for the product. There is talk of putting in a shingle mill but nothing definite has been done so far.
