



TRAIN SLOWS UP FOR COW

Gentle Mooley Pursued by Iron Horse on Canadian National Near Here

An amusing story of how a cow held up one of the Canadian National westbound passenger trains near Amsbury up the line from here is brought to the city by arrivals from the interior.

It happened that the train had just passed Amsbury station and was speeding westward when the cow loomed up on the tracks. On one side was a sheer drop to the Skeena River; on the other, a steep rock cut. In order to avoid hurling the gentle mooley into the river by striking it and the possibility of a derailment, there was nothing to do but slow up. The character of the land on the sides of the track remained the same for about four or five miles so the train crawled along at a very reduced speed until there was a break in the bluff at the side near the next station. Here the cow, after its exciting chase during which it had humped along for all it was worth, took to the bush and the train was able again to pick up speed.

BRITISH MONEY FOR PROVINCE

Hon. John Hart Says Investors Look to This Country for Opportunities

VICTORIA, Oct. 4.—More confident than ever of the high estimate placed on British Columbia securities by the world's money masters, Hon. John Hart, provincial minister of finance, returned to Victoria after a trip to more than two months to the British Isles and continental Europe.

When Mr. Hart left here in July what he sought primarily was a long vacation and an opportunity to revisit the scenes of his youth in Ireland and the war-devastated areas of Northern France. However, he managed to put in considerable time interviewing financial experts, government officials and businessmen regarding various phases of the investment and general economic situation in their relation to British Columbia. Although his trip was not an official one, Mr. Hart took advantage of the opportunity of studying the standing of this Province's credit in financial centres, such as London and New York, and what he was told convinced him that the investor who is, in the vernacular of the stock markets, "bearish" on British Columbia is decidedly shortsighted and foolish.

Has Own Troubles

Great Britain, while in a category of its own financially, when considered with other European countries, has a mass of complicated financial problems to solve and until some of these have been more thoroughly dealt with Canada cannot expect a tremendous inflow of British capital, the minister found.

Nevertheless, he found a genuine interest in British Columbia and in other sections of western Canada being displayed by Old Provincial and Dominion income taxes, thus eliminating the expense of duplication. He believes that some such plan will be worked out in detail shortly.
