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

The matter might well be taken up with the two ministers who are to be here today with a view to protecting the interests of this port.

The principle of taxing the motor fuel to pay for the roads is correct as long as it does not hit the innocent motor boats and especially the fish boats and other commercial craft.

Alaska's Nearness

Important To Us. The nearness of Alaska to this port sets us apart from the rest of the Dominion. Victoria is near Seattle but that affects only her overseas commerce. There is no fishing industry of any importance that is affected by the fact. Here Prince Rupert is the natural port for Alaska and is generally so viewed by the people of that territory. It is of benefit to them as well as to us to foster close commercial relationships and not to place any obstacles in the way of the freest possible trade.
