### Redistribution Bill Will be Amended States Premier Oliver Nothing Cut and Dried About it

VICTORIA, Dec. 1. - That the provincial government is not attempting to railroad a cut and dried redistribution bill through the Legislature but is willing to accept any reasonable changes in the measure was made evident yesterday when Premier Oliver announced that he himself intended to move an amendment to his own meausre.

"I'm prepared to leave every clause of the bill to the House and I intend to offer certain amendments," the premier told a representative of the Times. "We have not brought down
