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REMAINS OF DAVID BELL OF MASSETT FOUND ON BEACH

MASSETT, March 31.—After a persistent search during two weeks, the Massett Indians found the remains of one of their members lying on the beach on the shores of Graham Island. On the morning of the 3rd instant, David Bell, a young Indian, aged 32 years, took his launch across Massett Inlet, in search of timber for the building of a boat. Later in the day, the launch was seen, apparently drifting outside the harbor. Some of Bell's friends boarded the vessel, and found the engine running, but the man was missing. A small rowboat was also gone. A high wind was blowing, and it is presumed that the man was taken out to sea in the rowboat. Twenty Indians patrolled the beaches from Rose Spit to Langara Island during two weeks without result. On the morning of the 29th, the headless body of David Bell was found on the beach near the limits of the Massett reserve.

The deceased leaves a wife and two children, with a mother and sister, to mourn for a respected member of the Massett Band. Some years ago the father of David Bell was also drowned from a sealing boat.

The funeral took place on March 24 from the Church of St. John, Alfred Adams officiating at the church and graveside.

QUEEN CHARLOTTE
