BOY SCOUTS REQUEST CITY TO GRANT LAND

Would Establish Headquarters on Unused Property in McClymont Park

A delegation consisting of Geo. Rorie and J. A. Teng, representing the Boy Scouts' Association, and Rev. Dr. H. B. Grant and T. H. Johnson, representing the Rotary Club, appeared before the city council last night asking that permission be given the Boy Scouts to erect a cabin for headquarters on unused city property in McClymont Park near the corner of McBride Street and Eleventh Avenue. A letter laying the request formally before the council was read, the delegation was heard, and the matter was referred to the board of works for report.

Mr. Rorie explained the work of the association and urged that the council support it in granting the request which did not ask for any financial assistance. The Boy Scouts needed headquarters and he thought the erection of the cabin in McClymont Park would enhance the value of the property.

Dr. Grant dealt on the importance of leading boys in the right direction towards forming good characters. The Boy Scouts' Association was doing a valuable work in this respect. Victoria and Smithers had given land to the Boy Scouts for the erection of headquarters. All the local association was asking for was a temporary granting of the land which it was agreed should be available for the city on its demand.

T. H. Johnson also spoke briefly urging the council to give the permission asked. The cause was a worthy one.

The council did not discuss the matter.

CITY GIVES LUMBER TO SWIMMING CLUB

Old Plank From Hays Creek Bridge to be Used in Making Repairs at Salt Lakes

A request from the Prince Rupert Swimming Club that the city give old lumber from the Hays Creek bridge for use at the Salt Lakes in making repairs to the floats, etc., was granted by the council last night. Contractor E. H. Shockley, who made the request, was empowered to dispose of 2,000 feet of the old lumber accordingly. Appearing as a delegation with Mr. Shockley were David Thomson and A. T. Parkin.

Mr. Shockley said the lumber would be dropped into Hays Creek from the bridge and floated into the harbor through the dry dock culvert.

BROTHER OF LOCAL MAN IS AN ARTIST

Peter Balagno Designed First Prize Float at Victoria Maytime Frolic Pageant

The float of the Order of United Commercial Travellers, one of the most striking and artistic which was entered in the Maytime Frolic Pageant at Victoria recently, was designed and executed by Peter J. Balagno, artist brother of Charles Balagno, of this city. It took first prize in the competition for business floats. Representing many Victoria wholesale firms, the float was the first that was ever entered by the Order of United Commercial Travellers in Victoria.

"I consider it a great honor to walk away with first prize but I will put out a word-beater for the Order next year," stated Mr. Balagno.

The float was Egyptian in character. Four massive square pillars supported four arches with abutting projections. Immediately below was the large crescent emblem of the Order and inside was a throne all set off with a wealth of color and decoration, including palms and other tropical foliage.

In the Letter Box

FREEMAN COMPLAINS

Editor Daily News.

For your information I will call your attention to our shipping laws. Under the act all vessels are classed on this coast as one, two, three, four, Class 1 is

coastwise for ocean passenger traffic and takes in most of the two American continental-Pacific coastline. Class 2, is for passenger vessels plying between points not more than 100 miles between harbors. Class 3, is for sheltered waters passenger traffic. Class 4 is freight and tow boat service. The Narbethong is equipped for Class 2 according to the inspectors' written statement. I have applied for a license under Class 2, 3 and 4, to operate my boat to Stewart. I have been granted a license under Class 3 for four months, but while the law is definite in defining the duties of the inspector as well as mine, I have not been able to secure such license for the other eight months. The law says, I must have such license before I can legally operate my boat in trade or service. The law says further, the inspector must grant such license or give me a written statement showing upon what grounds license is refused. The inspector has failed to do his duty. We have now the Joy Bird, 34 foot long, under five tons; and the Dixie Rupert the same length over five tons; the "23" is a larger vessel than the Narbethong licensed under five tons, while the Narbethong is 13 tons. I have had Williams & Manson, attorneys at law, and Fisher & Oughlin, try every means within their power and knowledge to force the inspector to show just cause why the Narbethong should not be granted a license under one of the three classes. Although the waters from Skagway to Queen Charlotte Sound are properly Class 3 waters, the inspectors require vessels crossing Queen Charlotte Sound to come under the Class 2. The steamship companies have prevailed upon the inspectors to grant our licenses under the handicap of the vessels plying to Vancouver and Victoria. It was not permissible to have a local service.
