RAT SCOURGE

IS ON AGAIN

City Council Last Night Decided to Start a Virus Campaign Against Rodents

The medical health officer is to institute another rat extermination campaign in the city.

Ald. Collart brought up the subject at last night's council meeting. He said that rats were breeding at the Park Avenue dump and were becoming prevalent in Section 2. On Seventh Avenue he had seen three rats playing. There were many complaints. He would suggest the spreading of virus. Such a campaign should be undertaken generally throughout the city and the warm weather was the best time. He moved that the medical health officer be instructed to start such a campaign.

Ald. Macdonald seconded the motion saying that such a campaign had been successful before.

Ald. Perry objected saying that rats so poisoned would die in the houses with unpleasant results.

"The rats take to water on being poisoned," said Ald. Collart.

"Yes, and there is water under the houses," replied Ald. Perry.

"Dr. Cade assures us that it will be all right," said Ald. Collart.

The discussion closed with the carrying of the motion.

On recommendation of the fire chief, the city council last night decided to call for tenders for the supplying of seven uniforms for members of the fire department.

The Prince Rupert Boat House motorboat Pachena sails at 6 this evening for Stewart with Capt. Gammon in command. R. E. Moore will be among the passengers.

Then tender of John Myhill Jones of \$3.45 per trip for the taking of city officials to Shawatlans Lake was accepted last night by the council on recommendation of the finance committee.

The temporary borrowing by-law providing for \$30,000 to meet current city expenses pending the commencement of taxation collections was given its third reading by the city council last night.

The tender of Rose, Cowan & Latta of \$5.85 per page for the printing of the auditor's report for the year 1922 was accepted by the city council last night providing that the report does not exceed 15 pages.

The city council last night decided to call for applications for the position of pound-keeper and dog tax collector. This was done on recommendation of the Finance Committee. The suggested system of remuneration is 50 per cent of tax collections.

The finance committee recommended to the city council last night that the current hospital account for per capita payment be checked over by the treasurer's department and if found correct to be paid provided that payment is made only for patients domiciled in the province. The report was adopted.

An application from A. D. Holloy, approved by the chief of police and medical officer, for a license to operate the Empress Loggers' Club was received at last night's council meeting and referred to the Finance Committee. The matter of the application of Austin Henderson for the Dominion Club also came up and was again laid over pending a special meeting of the council this week which will go into the whole question of licenses.

ROCK DELIVERY

COSTS DISCUSSED

Board of Works Shows That Crusher Should Remain at Fifth Street

A report from the city engineer submitting comparative costs for the delivering of crushed rock for street surfacing on Fourth and Fifth Avenues was presented at last night's council meeting and was referred to the board of works for further report, provision also being made that a start should be made on moving the rock crusher from its present unsightly and inconvenient position on Second Avenue.

The following were the figures for delivery of rock as submitted by the engineer:

With crusher at Fifth Ave. and Tatlow St. delivery by cars and track, \$4.45; by truck, \$4.26.

With crusher remaining at Fifth Street, \$3.95.

The engineer also reported that to move the crusher from its present location to the Fifth Street lane would cost \$240, to move it to Fifth and Tatlow, \$539.

Mayor Newton said the board of works had decided it would be more economical to leave the crusher at Fifth Street.

Ald. Stephens questioned the estimate of the city engineer in delivering the rock by truck. He thought it could not be done for the figure estimated and moved that the report be sent back to the board of works for actual figures. Ald. Collart seconded this.

Ald. Munro said that all the figures available had been secured and moved that the crusher be moved to the Fifth Street lane and the rock delivered from there. There was no seconder and the motion carried.
