### DYBHAVN TO VISIT VICTORIA FOR CITY

Will interview Inspector of Municipalities and if Necessary Others Regarding Local Improvement Bylaws

While in the south, Ex-Ald. Dybhavn, who sailed last night for Vancouver and Spokane, will cross to Victoria and interview the inspector of municipalities and, if necessary, other provincial government officials in regard to Section 4 and 5 street surfacing local improvement, the passage of which, and consequently the sale of bonds, has been blocked by the inspector of municipalities on the claim that they are irregular. Ald. Stephens and Ald. Colliart last night submitted a motion to this effect providing for Mr. Dybhavn's expenses to Victoria and it was passed by the council.

The matter of the position of the bylaws was discussed. Mayor Newton said that the inspector of municipalities had again refused to pass the bylaws and had stated that special legislation would have to be effected for their ratification. Ald. Stephens thought that the lieutenant governor in council could ratify them and, if necessary, Mr. Dybhavn would meet the government.
