An offer from Mitchell & Currie to sell the city a quantity of common fir lumber which had been salvaged from the Cowper-Young buildings at the dry dock at \$15 per thousand was referred to the Board of Works for report at last night's council meeting.

The barkentine Alicia Hayside is at Ketchikan this week loading spruce lumber for "Sydney" and Melbourne, Australia. This is the second schooner to load spruce direct at Ketchikan this year for Australia. The first was the Anna Gony which is now on the way to Australia.

A report of the Board of Works recommending the refusal of the Canadian National Railway's proposition that the city take a lease on the Pacific Place roadway leading to the waterfront and maintain the thoroughfare was adopted by the city council last night.

If the property holders affected want the sidewalk on Brian Street renewed they will have to petition the city council to do the work under the local improvement plan. A report to this effect from the Board of Works was adopted by the council last night.

The report of the fire department for the month of January showing that there had been no fire calls in that period was received and filed by the city council last night. A section of the report recommending the cleaning up of all the lanes in the city was referred to the sanitary inspector for his attention.

A letter stating that the provincial government was planning to put in a permanent sidewalk from McBride Street to the new court house at Market Square was received by the city council last night from the government agent. This was in answer to the city's proposition offering to put in a sidewalk at the government's expense.

Favorable reports being submitted by the chief of police and other officials as required, the city council last night granted club licenses for 1923 to the Grand Terminal Club, B. F. Self, manager, and the Skeena Club, Alexander Gooch, manager.

A request from E. F. Duby, for the Prince Rupert Lumber Co., asking for a reduction in the minimum charge for water supply at the Seal Cove mill was received by the city council last night and referred to the Finance Committee, who will hear Mr. Duby before reporting to the council.

Edward F. Jones, the new city clerk and solicitor, took his official seat at last night's meeting. He was formally introduced to the aldermen by Mayor Newton who welcomed him expressing the hope that his long past civic experience would prove of value to this city. The mayor's remarks and the reply of Mr. Jones were received with applause.

Mrs. Mary Ellen Smith's "Town Planning Bill," which is now before the legislature and which was sent to the city council for further suggestions, was laid over for further information by the council last night. Ald. Stephens said he had read the bill over and did not like it. City Solicitor Jones thought there was little likelihood of it passing the legislature. He had been in the House at Victoria when it was under discussion and had come to that conclusion.
